Ration Time
RECIPES

You needn't worry about the meat shortage if you utilize leftovers in Thrifty Meat Pinwheels. They're tops in eye and appetite appeal and they're easy to make with light, flaky margarine biscuit dough.

THRIFTY MEAT PINWHEELS

- 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon margarine
- 2 cups ground cooked beef, ham, or pork
- 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
- 2 teaspoons pickle relish, if desired
- 3 tablespoons water or gravy
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup margarine
- 2/3 cup milk (about)

Sauté onion in margarine until lightly browned. Add to meat. Add water or gravy, mustard, and pickle relish, if desired. Mix well. Season to taste. Sift flour. Measure. Add baking powder and salt and sift into a bowl. Cut in margarine. Add milk all at once, stirring until flour is dampened. Turn out on lightly floured board; knead 30 seconds. Roll into rectangular shape 1/4 inch thick. Spread meat mixture on dough. Roll up like a jelly roll. Cut into about 10 slices and place cut-side up on greased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (450° F) about 25 minutes or until done. Serves about 5.

Obituary

MRS. ALICE H. GIBONS

Mrs. Alice H. Gibbons of Sandy, a resident of the area for 77 years, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. S. Bacon of route one, Sandy, last Wednesday. She was 90 years old at the time of her death.

Mrs. Gibbons was born at Albion, Iowa April 13, 1853 and came west across the plains with her parents when she was 13. On September 5, 1880, she was married to George G. Gibbons at Powell Valley. She had the distinction of having taught one of the first public schools in Portland, one that was conducted in Livermore's store in Stephens addition. She had been a member of the Christian church since she was 19.

In 1929 she was chosen queen of the Sandy Old Settlers society. Her husband preceded her in death in 1931.

Besides Mrs. Bacon, she is survived by one other daughter, Mrs. C. W. Struthers of Tigard, and a son, Fred R. of Eugene, 12 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Carroll chapel Saturday, with Rev. S. W. Hall officiating. Pall bearers were George Ten Eyck, Frank Bacon, Tom McGuire, A. W. Klingler, Delbert Jadwin, and David Klingler. Burial was in Cliffside cemetery near Sandy.
