CROSSING ACCIDENTS ARE INCREASING

Hazards at railroad crossings have been greatly increased due to wartime demands on railroad transportation the safety division of the secretary of states office explained today. Military demands for transportation of supplies, material and troops have resulted in a sharp increase in the number of trains and in greater speeds in many crossings.

Indicative of the activity at many Oregon grade crossings the safety division declared that at one crossing in an Oregon city, not Portland, a traffic count showed 1870 motor vehicles using the crossing daily. This same crossing handles 66 separate train movements during the same 24-hour period. At this particular crossing there have been 20 accidents in the past ten years, three of which resulted in fatalities. Two of these fatalities, occurred during the past twelve months.

These safety precautions were suggested by the safety division as a means of preventing grade crossing accidents.

- 1 Stop at all mainline crossings on streets and highways.
- 2 When a train is approaching allow it to pass before proceeding across the tracks.
- 3 Make sure driving window is rolled down when approaching tracks so that the warning whistle of an approaching train may be heard.
- 4 Never assume no trains will be coming at any crossing, main or branch line. Look for trains before crossing tracks.
- 5 At night, exercise additional care not to overlook low flat cars or skeleton log cars on the crossing.
- 6 Where there are two or more tracks, remember that after one train has passed, there may be another on another track.
- 7 When approaching a grade crossing, slow down, be prepared to stop.

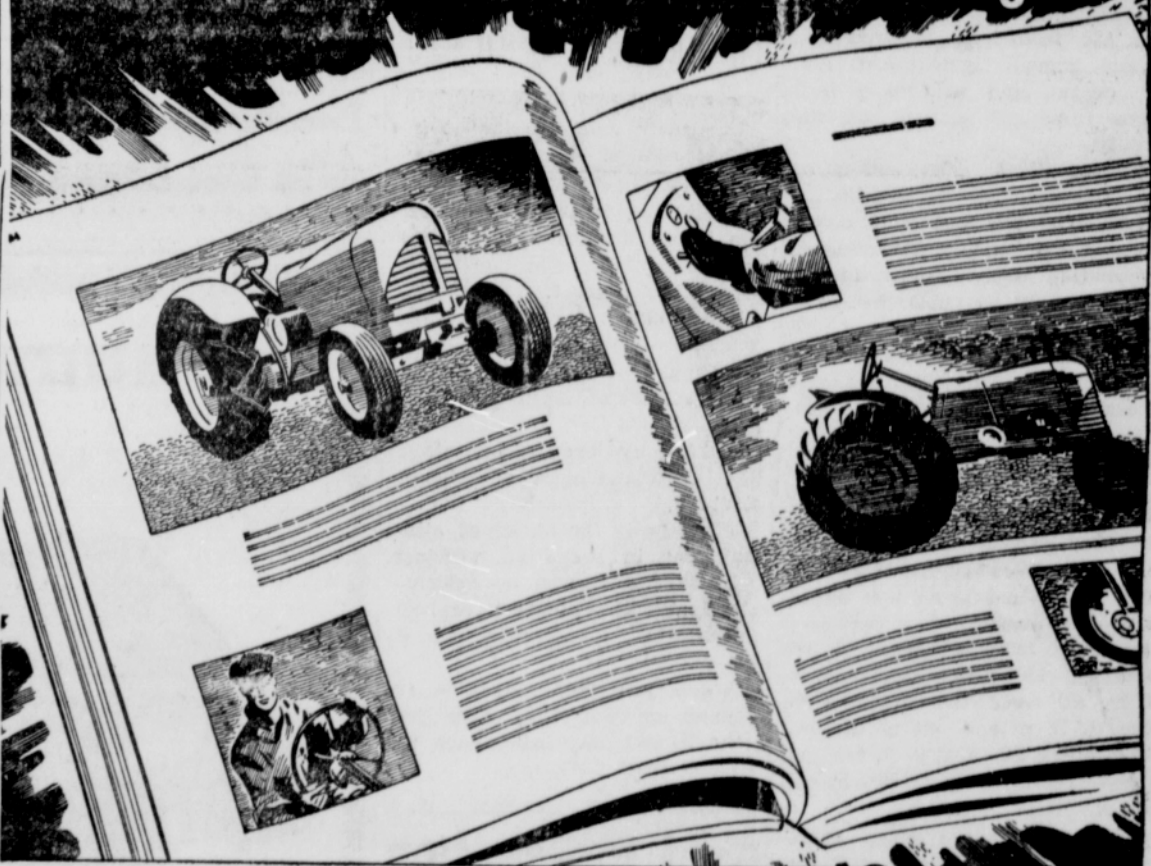
