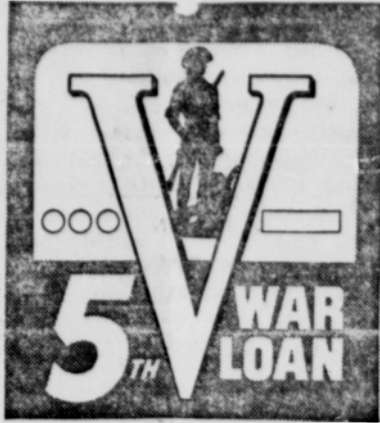
Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Letum and family are moving this week to Sandy where they will make their future home.

Boys For Full Time Farm Work Profitful

The supply of boys from 14 to 17 years old wanting full-time work on Oregon farms this summer is considerably higher than the present demand from farmers reports J. R. Beck, state farm labor supervisor for the OSC extension service.

Many more boys actually applied for the special farm training short course sponsored at OSC by the state farm labor office than can be placed on the basis of present requests from farmers Beck says. The second of three brief farm training periods is in session at Corvallis this week.

"Most of these boys are either right off the farm or have had some experience," Beck says. "The training they get at OSC is not complete of course but they are given helpful pointers in tractor driving, dairy work, chores and general farm work. They should be quite a help to a farmer hard pressed for someone to work around the place."

Requests for these boys may be made thru the county farm labor employment office or directly to Russell M. Adams assistant state farm labor supervisor at Corvallis.

MECHANICAL DEFECTS INCREASE ACCIDENTS

Traffic accidents as a result of mechanical defects are increasing this year according to the safety division of the secretary of state's office. Accidents as a result of tire failure, brake failure, steering gear failure and lack of repair of rear lights are showing increases.

While vehicle defects played a minor part in traffic accidents in the past, they may be expected to be an increasing factor now that cars are getting older according to the safety division. With few new cars available and replacement parts difficult to obtain mechanical defects are more likely to be causative factors in accidents.

To prevent these accidents the safety division urges motorists to check their vehicles regularly. Periodic inspection of steering gear, brakes, tires, lights and wheel assemblies will reveal danger points that can be corrected before they cause an accident.
