Irma Hurst is back on the job as telephone operator at the local exchange after a brief vacation trip.

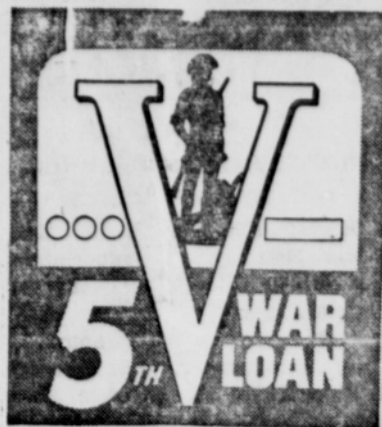
Mrs. Clint Looney of Estacada was a business visitor in Sandy Monday morning.
