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Two Sandy Boys Killed In Action

This community was saddened early this week when the news was released that two of the young men had been killed in action in widely separated areas of the war. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the grief stricken parents in the loss of their loved ones.

Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Hoyt of the Bluff Road were notified last Thursday evening that their son, Irving, had been killed in action in the South Pacific area. The young man was the youngest of three sons in the armed forces. No details of how he was killed have been learned as yet.

Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Funk of Sandy, route 1, were notified by telegram from the war department last Friday that their son, Henry had been killed in action in France. The young man was a member of a paratroop division and was killed in battle. No details of how he met death were furnished as yet.

FORMER SANDY BOY WINS PROMOTION

Promotion of Russell R. Carter of Vancouver, Wash to the grade of sergeant in the army air forces was announced last week at the Antilles Air command headquarters at Puerto Rico.

Entering the army December 29, 1941 at Portland, Oregon, Sgt. Carter joined his present organization in February, 1943 and is stationed at an air base in Puerto Rico.

Sergt. Carter was born September 14, 1911 and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward F. Carter, route 1, Sandy. Before entering the army he resided at 707 Franklin St., Vancouver, Wash.

Bases of the Antilles air command of which is a member are located strategically from the western tip of Cuba to equatorial South America covering an area 30 times that of the state of Washington. The bases form protective barriers for the gateways to the three Americas and serve as stepping stones on the air supply routes to the fighting fronts of the world.

Bail was set at \$5000.

ELDON ALLDREDGE APPOINTED CO. TREASURER

At 2:45 Friday afternoon Eldon M. Alldredge of Gladstone officially took over the office of treasurer of Clackamas county.

His bond for \$50,000 issued by the Fidelity and Deposit company of Maryland was signed and approved by the county court at which time Mr. Alldredge, former county auditor, opened the doors of the office for business. He succeeds W. W. Everhart of Molalla who died last week after serving some 20 years in the office.

Allredge will serve until he or some other person is elected at the general election in November. There were no formalities in his taking over the post of Mr. Everhart. Some political and veteran's angles have developed over the appointment of Alldredge to the position.

Students Are Heavy Bond Buyers

Students in Oregon schools purchased \$9,059,992.50 in war bonds and stamps from September, 1943 to June 1, 1944 representing a per capita investment of \$34.33 it was announced by Mrs. F. W. Blum, schools-at-war chairman, Oregon war finance committee. This standing does not include participation by college students who purchased an additional \$1,491,063. The purchase of bonds and stamps by Catholic schools of the western archdiocese which amount to \$252,481.80 a per capita rating of \$25.45 has also been omitted from the total.

Clackamas county pupils purchased \$355,163. of the \$9,059,992.50 amount Mrs. Blum reports. "We are especially proud of Oregon's schools-at-war showing" stated E. C. Sammons state chairman, Oregon war finance committee, "since the purchase of \$34.33 per pupil compares very favorably with the \$19.80 per capita quota set by Washington, D. C."

Producer's price delivered to wholesale receiving point outside of free delivery area: Red raspberries, \$1.79; black raspberries \$1.61; blackberries \$1.49; dewberries \$1.49.

Producer's price delivered to premises of retail store: Red raspberries \$2.19; black raspberries \$2.01; blackberries \$1.89; dewberries \$1.89.

FOOD SUPPLIES MAY GET SHORTER

Government officials "in the know" advise that food supplies may not be as plentiful later on. Home canners may be very glad if they have stuck to their job says Janet Taylor, Clackamas county home demonstration agent. Fewer people seem to be raising gardens than last year. Some of these folks may find themselves up against high price as a shortage of certain foods later on. Canning of fruits and vegetables is especially important. Of the twelve major canned fruits seventy percent more are needed for war purposes this year than in 1943. Of fifteen major canned vegetables, seventy-one percent more are needed for war purposes this year than last, Marvin Jones, food administrator says, "Because we have plenty now it does not follow that we will have plenty later." Apparently this is no time to slow down in home canning. Let's fill up the jars and cans again, says Miss Taylor.

"LEARN TO SWIM" CAMPAIGN AT BLUE LAKE PARK

Swimmers and those eager to learn how to swim will be glad to know that the annual "Learn to Swim" campaign is scheduled at Blue Lake Park from July 24 to August 4, inclusive from 10 a.m. to 12 noon each day.

Free instruction will be given to both children and adults who are beginners, intermediate or advanced swimmers and Red Cross certificates will be awarded to those who pass the various tests.

A. D. Hick, director of the water and safety department of the Multnomah county chapter of the Red Cross will head the group of instructors which will include Orpha Watson, Jasper Rogers, Hazel Mitchell and Harold Spoelstra.

While there is no admission charge a small tax must be collected according to state and federal regulations.

Everyone can learn to swim according to the Red Cross which points out that the importance of knowing how to swim for safety and for recreation value grows each year.

OREGON BUYS \$4,888,440 WORTH OF BONDS

The participation of the state of Oregon in the Fifth War loan amounted to a purchase of \$4,888,440 as fixed by the state bond commission on recommendation of State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott and was announced by Gov. Earl Snell, chairman. L. O. Arens member of the state industrial commission is the other commission member.

The bulk of bonds purchased are early maturities, according to Scott which was deemed necessary because of the needs of the state for cash to carry on its activities such as post-war plans beneficial to returned servicemen and industrial workers no longer engaged in war plant work.

EAGLE CREEK GIRL JOINS WAVES

Scheduled to release a navy man for service at sea is Miss Myrtle Mae McDonald of Eagle Creek who has just enlisted in the Waves it was announced last week by the Waves enlistment headquarters for Oregon at 735 SW Alder Street, Portland.

Miss McDonald is the second member of her family to volunteer for the armed forces, her brother Clarence McDonald being a private in the U. S. army now serving overseas. Miss McDonald has been employed as a key punch operator with the state unemployment compensation commission at Salem since September, 1943.

Miss McDonald graduated from Estacada union high school in 1943 where she was a member of the girls athletic association and was a typist on the school paper. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce McDonald of Eagle Creek.

MT. HOOD FORESTS RETURN \$11,317 IN LIEU OF TAXES

Clackamas county received in lieu of taxes for 546,360 acres of publicly owned lands within the Mt. Hood national forest during the fiscal year of 1943 a total of \$11,317.00.

The information is made available in the report of Foster Steele, acting supervisor of the Mt. Hood forest.

The federal government allocates to counties for school and road purposes 25 percent of the receipts from national forests each year. The distribution is based upon the acreage of national forest lands within the county.

Since 1906 when the law became effective Clackamas county has received \$109,921.93 from this source.

The 25 percent fund for all counties within the Mt. Hood national forest amounted to a total of \$22,826.80 for the fiscal year 1943 according to Clare Hende, forest supervisor.
