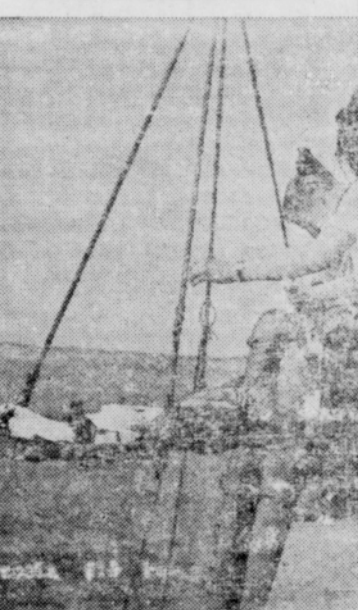

AAA Offers 60c Payment For Saving Legume Straw

Growers of vetch and pea seed crops in Oregon this season will be able to earn an AAA practice payment for leaving all the straw on the ground when combining or by returning it to the soil if a stationary outfit is used the state AAA office has announced. The payment amounts to 60 cents an acre.

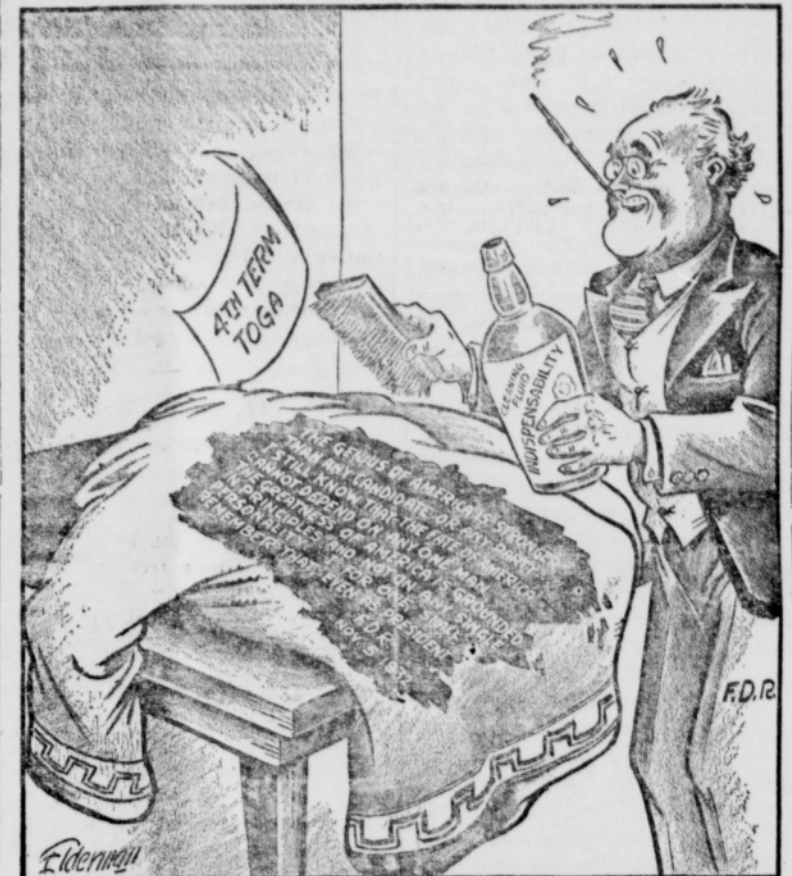
This practice was authorized for the first time last year but the action was so late that little could be done to make it widely known. The fertilizer value of the legume straw is high and the additional organic matter improves the soil structure making full use of such straw one of the best conservation practices according to OSC soil specialists.

Bulletin on Feeds for Layers Revised at OSC

Feed represents the largest item of cost in the business of producing eggs, points out H. E. Cosby, head of the poultry department at Oregon state college in a late revision of a previous bulletin, "Feeding Laying Hens."

This extension bulletin No. 633 discusses fundamental factors in feeds for egg production, feeding methods, and handling diets for breeding hens and those laying hens kept in individual cages. Casby says that mass production practices, increased egg production per hen, year-round confinement of laying stock and other industry developments have increased feeding problems but that research has in the main kept pace with these changes.
