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PIONEERS PICNIC DRAWS LARGE CROWD

grade school building at Gresham. The present school grounds and the cemetery were taken in part from the place occupied by the Sieret family and in this dwelling there were born Eva Dorothy Sieret and her two younger sisters who all attended school in the little white school house near by.

In 1897 Eva Dorothy married Charles Idlemann and moved to Salem where they lived for five years. Mr. and Mrs. Idlemann then moved to Sandy and opened a store which business proved successful. After a time they sold the store to a nephew, Geo. Bornstedt, and then moved to Portland. In 1915 they went to Idaho where they lived till 1934 at which time they returned to Sandy and again entered in business. And we all hope that Eva and Charles continue to reside in Sandy for many, many years to come.

Mrs. August Bartsch daughter of John E. Bramhall reviewing her father's life and that of his pioneer parents, in part as follows: John E. Bramhall was the eldest son of Eleazer Smith Bramhall and Martha Ann Bramhall who arrived in Oregon from Kansas in 1882. The late Jonas Chae moved them to his place near Bull Run. They forded the river near what is now Dodge park climbed the steep mountain on the opposite side following a mere trail to the place they were to make their home. They lived for several weeks under a shelter of vine maple, until a clearing could be made and logs hewn to erect a log house. Provisions were carried in from the store at Sandy. Their cook stove was carried piece by piece up the mountain. Later Mr. Bramhall was influential in getting a postoffice established and named Aimes and was himself postmaster for a number of years. He also constructed a saw mill at first powered by a huge water wheel but later turned in to steam power. Lumber from this mill was used for the first

pipe line from Bull Run to Portland as well as for building roads, bridges, schools and many houses and barns for the early settlers. The first logging was done with ox teams and "some extremely persuasive language."

John E. Bramhall who was born in Carlyle, Iowa in October of 1860 remained to farm in Kansas, later moving to Cambridge City, Indiana. It was not until 1894 that he decided to come to Oregon with his wife, Eva Iowa Bramhall and small daughter. He worked for a time in his father's mill at Aimes but spent most of his life farming and dairying. After his wife died over a year ago he has made his home with his daughter and in October of this year he will have lived 84 years of extremely modest though honest living.

C. E. Bunn of Fairview whose grandparents crossed the plains in 1843 and whose great uncle was a circuit rider in his address stressed the emigration of the forties giving much important historical data. He stated that the first band of sheep, twenty in number, was brot by Joshua Shaw in 1844. The second flock by Hugh Fields in 1847 which were driven to Waldo Hills. The next flock of 300 head was brot by Joseph Watt to Lafayette in 1848. This resulted in the first woolen mill being built in Albany in 1853. He related that Joseph Watt bought a consignment of Seth Thomas clocks from a trading vessel, then traded them to the settlers at from 20 to 60 bushels of wheat each. These clocks had wooden wheels and cast iron weights. The first machinery in early grist mills also were provided with wooden gears and sprockets. The first grist mill was built in 1840 at Franch Prairie. Peter Burnett captain of a train in '43 became the first governor of California and together with General M. M. Carver, laid out the townsite of Linn-ton in 1844. "The pioneers," he said, "were the founders of our agriculture and manufacturing institutions. But the real foundation on which they built and left as our heritage was their spirit of courage, self-re-

liance, live of freedom and the determination to develop their own resources and shape their own destinies. It is our responsibility to the youth of today to see that these principles are perpetuated."

Walter Meacham of Portland, secretary of the Old Oregon Trail association also urged that the young people carry on the good old American traditions, "ism" is Americanism. He said the pioneers who made romantic, colorful history were young people. The "Old Pony Express" boys were in their teens and Buffalo Bill only 16 when he began his colorful career. He announced that from Seaside to Independence, Missouri the association was providing markers of the Old Oregon Trail using Oregon cedar posts branded with "The Old Oregon Trail" and that on September 15 of this year in every school yard on the "blazed by Barlow" route the initial step will be taken to erect pyramids of native rocks gathered by the boys and girls. His slogan was "Save Old America for Young America."

Edward Brown of Portland gave a brief talk on the Amalgamation of the American People. Mrs. Joe Bramhall of Chico, Calif., recited a poem and told in her humorous way how she first met her husband at a pioneer meeting some years ago. She is the former Freda Hatch whose father pioneered on Sandy Ridge.

Prizes were awarded to the eldest man and woman present by E. F. Bruns went to James Fegles, 91 and Alice Revenue Webster, V. D. Butler awarded a cash prize to the youngest child of pioneer stock present. This went to the two months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Asch-off.

The old time fiddlers contest was judged a tie and equal prizes awarded to J. A. Jones of Portland and Charles Bailey of Cherryville.

Soloists on the program were Miss Phyllis Lauderback and Mrs. Eva Stone, a niece of the queen and Miss Norma Hale pleased the audience with her accordion selections.

The consensus of opinion seemed to be that this was one of the best meetings ever held by the Sandy Pioneer Society and the members will look forward to the winter meeting to be held next January.
