War Material Shortage No. 1

In response to a letter from Donald M. Nelson addressed to Dr. Elbert K. Fretwell, Chief Scout Executive Boy Scouts of America, the Boy Scout nation wide paper program opened on Tuesday, August 1 to continue until September 30, 1944.

Following is an excerpt from Mr. Nelson's letter: "For many months now the Boy Scouts of America have been rendering yeoman service to the nation by salvaging waste paper. However the waste paper shortage is still with us.

With the invasion of France in full swing and with increased military activity in other theatres, expenditures of war material are greater now than ever before. Food, medical supplies, blood plasma, ammunition and every piece of machinery which our fighting men are using are packed in, made of, or protected by paper.

Waste paper is still our No. 1 war material shortage. As our battle lines push closer to the fighting becomes more intense, heart of the enemy and the our need for waste paper grows. If we are to meet the paper requirements for military and essential civilian needs, we must collect and move to the paper mills an average of 667,000 tons of waste paper per month. This is the amount of waste paper which America MUST turn in on the home front to back the war effort.

I, therefore, call upon the Boy Scouts of America to participate as fully and effectively as possible in the collection of waste paper with a special concentration of effort during the months of August and September, 1944. Because of their past achievements I am confident that they can strike a real blow for VICTORY—as they have done so often before."

The Thing for YOU to DO—COLLECT PAPER

1 Waste basket paper, wrappers, envelopes, etc. Pack down in corrugated box so that it can be carried.

2 Brown paper and bags, corrugated and cardboard boxes and cartons. Flatten and tie in bundles about 12 inches high.

3 Magazines and books. Tie them in bundles about 18 inches high for easy handling by collectors.

4 Newspapers. Fold them flat, the way the paper boy sells them, and tie in bundles about 12 inches high.

5 Bigder twine will be furnished upon request. Telephone the scoutmaster, J. C. Hafley 16x8, or drop a postcard to Box 24, Sandy, Oregon.

6 First collection will be made on Monday, September 4. Have your paper ready. The board is counting on us. We are counting on you.

NOTED MOUNT HOOD GUIDE DIED TUESDAY

Mark W. Weygant, 62, for many years a guide on Mount Hood and who had scaled that peak 588 times, died Tuesday at his home in Portland. He has been in ill health since 1932.

Mr. Weygant was born in Excelsior, Ill., on December 16, 1881. While still a boy he set out on a bicycle trip with two brothers and they pedaled their way from Polo, Ill., to The Dalles, Oregon.

He was the winner of the first ski race in the northwest along a course from Cloud Cap Inn to Kirby camp on the Cooper spur road. He was a constant booster for winter sports on the mountain.

Mr. Weygant was instrumental in the establishment of the Lookout cabin on Mt. Hood in creation of the Portland Snow shoe club and the annual American climb to the peak.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Monday at the Gable Funeral parlors at 225 N.E. 80th avenue with interment in Lone Fir cemetery.

BUSY MONTH FOR NSC CHAPLAINS

Church services held at 45 Ninth service command installations thruout the eight western states during May by army chaplains were attended by 146,976 persons it was announced today at the Fort Douglas, Utah, headquarters of Major General David McCoach, Jr. commanding general.

In addition to holding 3,473 services chaplains also visited 53,209 hospital patients, held 15,130 soldiers interviews, conducted 111 marriage ceremonies, performed 45 baptisms and officiated at 91 funerals.

PLANT AT CARVER IS BEING READED

Completely remodeled and equipped with machinery, stills, cogreter tanks and other apparatus now being installed the Carver Distillery company plant at Carver will be ready for operation this fall to make industrial alcohol from grain, potatoes, cull fruit or any other distillable material announces Ben Walling, the manager.

Most of the tanks, stills and other machinery used last year for making apple brandy have been moved out and only a portion of this equipment, principally fermentation tanks, will be re-installed Walling indicates.

CITY MAKES IMPROVEMENTS AT DUMP GROUNDS

The dump ground of the city of Sandy was bulldozed it was reported with Tupper's bulldozer. The city has erected a \$10 fine for anyone caught dumping rubbish anywhere on the ground except over the end of the ramp which was constructed for that purpose.

The city council also has contacted an engineer to make a survey of the city water works and make suggestions as to the placing of a new water tank and also inspect the water mains.

MULTNOMAH CO. FAIR OPENS AUGUST 21

Just a little more than two weeks remain before the gates of the Multnomah county fair opens for the 38th annual agricultural exposition at Gresham, August 21 to 27. Manager A. H. Lea reports that many entries have been received to date but there is still time for prospective exhibitors to enter their livestock and homemaking projects in several departments.

Foultry department entries closed August 9 as did grange and garden club entry lists. Livestock entries do not close until August 16, textile and art August 19, land products, floral, domestic science and 4-H club work on August 20.

"Our county fair was started as a means of helping farmers produce larger and better quality crops and livestock. Now, more than ever, the fair is serving this purpose and also offering entertainment to help to maintain wartime morale," Lea declared.

An increase of nearly 100 in the total value of premiums to be offered by the 1944 fair is drawing far larger early inquiries and requests for entry blanks than in any previous year, Lea said. A total of \$11,000 in premium awards will be given in comparison to approximately \$8,000 in past years.
