INCOME TAX REDUCTION TO DROP

Income tax payer of Oregon who have enjoyed a 75 percent discount in the tax levy for 1944 cannot expect more than a 30 percent levy in 1945 it was indicated by the employees of the tax commission.

Determination of the 1945 levy is held up by the delay of the annual state tax levy which in turn is being delayed by the failure of one Oregon assessor to file his county's valuations with the tax commission.

The tax commission was still without any further word from this assessor on Tuesday but he had promised to file his figures this week. The tax law provides that the annual state levy shall be made in July but Attorney General Neuner has held that this provision is directive and sot mandatory and that delay in its promulgation will in no wise invalidate the levy.

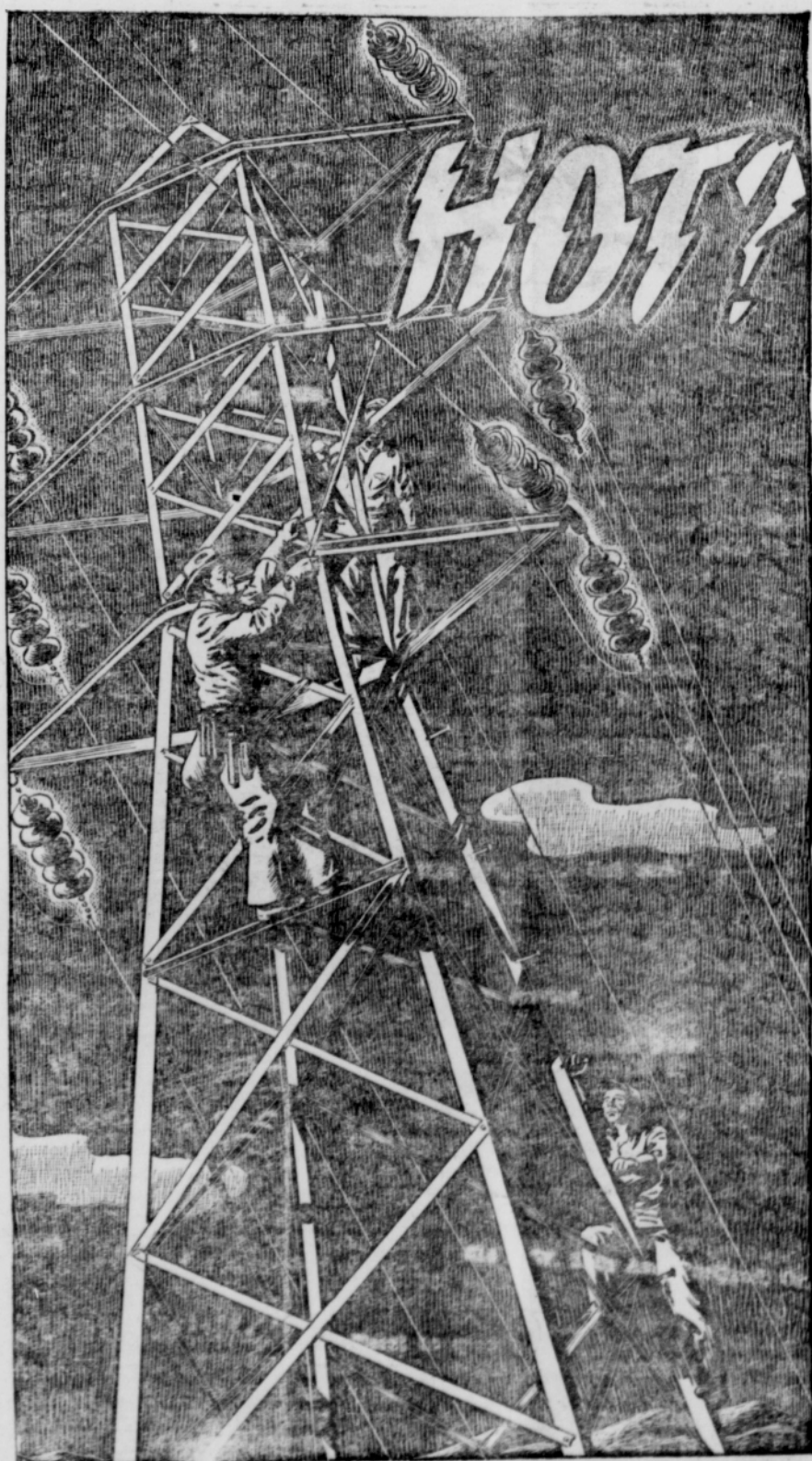
