OREGON'S FALL HARVEST CALLS 50,000 PICKERS

Approximately 50,000 pickers will be needed from about August 20 to September 20 to harvest Oregon's seasonal crops according to estimates of J. R. Beck state farm labor supervisor in the OSC extension service.

Picking of hops and prunes will overlap the snap bean harvest to take the greatest number of farm workers, but potatoes, pears, apples, sugar beets and the smaller acreages of other important crops also will require thousands of workers. Crop estimates indicate increased production this year for hops, beans, apples pears and sugar beets. The prune crop will be considerably less and the potato crop in central Oregon and Klamath county is expected to be larger but for the state as a whole will be somewhat smaller than last year.

The approximate 50,000 Mexicans working in Oregon at the farm labor peak will represent only about 10 percent of the total number of seasonal workers Beck points out. They will play a vital part in the harvest however, by taking up the slack in hop and prune pickers by maintaining a labor balance so an adequate supply of bean pickers will be available and by taking over the thousands of youngsters who return to school in September. Since much of the fall harvest of pears, apples and potatoes is distant from centers of population and also is work not well adapted to smaller youngsters, the Mexicans will fill an important gap Beck adds.

Camps for Mexicans will operate in the Willamette, Rogue River and Hood River valleys, in central Oregon and Klamath and Malheur counties. Camps at Salem, Grants Pass, Independence and Dayton will provide the largest number of hop and prune pickers. After the labor peak is passed in Oregon some of the Mexicans will be moved to harvest apples in the Yakima valley and sugar beets in Idaho.

Use of "F" Truck to Help Neighbor Approved by Law

The extent to which farmers owning trucks of "F" plate registry are authorized to do haul-

ing for their neighbor is explained in the recent bulletin on farm transportation facts issued by the OSC extension service as a leaders handbook. Paul Carpenter author of the bulletin and leader of the extension service farm transportation project, obtained legal opinions on this subject which include the following essential facts.

1 Any "F" plate truck owner, in addition to hauling his own produce and supplies to and from may "infrequently and for a nominal consideration haul such crops and livestock produced and supplies consumed and used by other farmers in his immediate neighborhood.

The term "infrequently" is defined as meaning any number of trips not exceeding 20 in any one month and not exceeding 40 trips in any one year. The "immediate neighborhood" is subject to a common sense interpretation and varies widely in different parts of the state.

2 For a nominal consideration but without limitation as to frequency he may haul to any market the agricultural commodities produced by neighbors and may deliver farm supplies to them, providing such neighbors are within a radius of five miles of the farmer furnishing the hauling service if the operation is west of the Cascade mountains, or within a radius of 10 miles if east of the mountains.

"Nominal consideration" is defined as any charge mutually agreeable. To an increasing extent farmers hauling for other farmers are charging the published rates permitted common and anywhere-for-hire carriers, says Carpenter. No restrictions as to distance, frequency or consideration apply when an "F" plate operator hauls farm products from a farm adjoining his own.

"Operating privileges for "F" plate holders are more liberal than generally appreciated" says Carpenter. "Most violations arise from misuse of equipment on the highways and hauling non-agricultural products or supplies."

Why a Farmer Should Buy and Keep War Bonds

LIEUT. GEN. LESLEY J. McNAIR—Gen. McNair, who was reported killed on the front line in Normandy July 27, is the highest ranking officer to fall in battle in the history of the United States Army. Upon the streamlining of the Army two years ago he was placed in command of the Ground Forces and directed the organization and training of an Army of 1,700,000 men. He was wounded in action while inspecting the American lines in Tunisia in April, 1943. In the First World War Gen. McNair served with the First Division, AEF, and later at general headquarters at Paris and Chaumont.

THE American farmer is ready now to make personal sacrifices beyond what the government has asked him to do by direct taxation. He will do this to hasten the end of the war and in this way save lives and the mental anguish which comes from separation of families and living under strange and uncomfortable conditions, both on the battle fronts and in defense centers. The most logical sacrifice for the next few months is to operate the farm as economically as possible consistent with high production and to spend as little as is consistent with good health and spiritual alertness for living costs, and then put the balance into War Bonds.

The farmer will in 1944 be more able than during the past 2 or 3 years to buy Bonds. Up until 1941 most farmers had gone through 10 years of acute agricultural depression and 20 years of below normal incomes. Most of them had long-time and current indebtedness forcing their hands at all times. Now in the main these debts are in a shape in which the farmer is master or they are completely paid off and forgotten. The farmer has at last a free choice as to what he will do with his modest and well-earned "earnings."

From the standpoint of good business there are many good reasons for buying Bonds now and keeping them.

1. It is better to buy Bonds than to bid against other farmers for what few farms are now for sale and thus inflate land prices.

2. It is better to reduce large inventories of livestock and put the money in Bonds now when meat is much needed and high priced than to carry over into the postwar period or into the next drought when there will be rapid liquidation and probably packing house glut and lower prices.

3. Farmers are all familiar with the wisdom of saving now to replace equipment wearing out but not being replaced.

4. Saving money as Bonds will make possible new homes, barns and conveniences after the war when the boys need a job installing these things.

5. Perhaps we need to mention the high pressure stock and town real estate salesmen and sellers of other "gold bricks". Buy Bonds and be out of ready funds when these "gents" appear.
