LABOR DAY TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS HEAVY

Labor Day week end traffic accidents have claimed a toll of 24 lives in Oregon during the past four years the safety division of the secretary of state's office disclosed today in urging Oregon drivers to avoid accidents this year.

The Labor Day holiday toll for the past four years is as follows: 1943, ten fatalities; 1942, two fatalities 1941 nine fatalities; 1940 four fatalities.

Speed too great for traffic conditions and lack of good traffic judgment in passing were the two chief factors in these accidents according to the safety division. The exercise of good traffic judgment is particularly important in such matters as passing other cars on a busy highway. Passing on curves or when approaching the brow of a hill is dangerous and resulted in several of the Labor Day fatalities in past years.

The safety division listed these safety precautions to avoid Labor Day accidents this year:

- 1 Keep speed down to the 35 mile wartime speed limit.
- 2 Never pass on curves or when approaching the brow of a hill.
- 3 In busy traffic keep a safe distance between your car and the car ahead.
- 4 Never drive when sleepy or fatigued.
- 5 Keep alert when passing recreation areas here pedestrians may be crossing the road.
