Hundreds of acres of fall pastures will be seeded in Clackamas county this fall because of seasonal rains. Most permanent pastures will contain mixtures of the fescue grasses and subterranean clover. Suggested proportions of grasses and legumes will be found in the Clackamas county pasture circular issued by the extension office in Oregon City. In addition to recommended mixtures for varied conditions the bulletin contains directions for pasture management and fertilization. Since this pasture bulletin was issued less than a year ago nearly a thousand copies have been distributed on individual request.

Late May planted Eureka dent corn on the Red Soils experimental area has a goodly portion of mature ears while some fields of ordinary yellow dent corn seen throuot the county can scarcely be expected to get beyond the dough stage before frost.

With adapted seed of early maturing field corn varieties available it is somewhat puzzling to know why a few growers persist in using common yellow dent seed corn of unknown origin. Such corn seldom matures a successful crop of grain and for silage does not compare in the total digestible nutrients produced per acre by one of the several recommended hybrids.

Salt-Treated Posts in Test Pass 16-Year Mark

Posts in the experimental post farm at Oregon state college that were treated with the so-called salt treatment before setting have completed 16 years without a single failure according to the latest progress report issued on this project as engineering experiment station bulletin 9-E. This is not an agricultural bulletin but copies may be had free by writing direct to the engineering experiment station at Corvallis.

None of the 75 Douglas fir posts set in January 1928 after being given the salt treatment has failed nor have any of the 25 lodge pole pine posts set in 1938 failed altho most of the untreated lodge pole posts set at the same time have rotted off, whether set green or dead. The bulletin also shows the life of posts of other species.

The alt treatment is not new in regon though it has not been generally used says T. J. Starker professor of forestry on leave, who has been in active charge of the project. Posts are treated while green with a tablespoonful of a mixture made up of equal parts of corrosive sublimate, arsenic and common salt.

A three-fourths inch hole is bored in the post about six inches above the ground line slanting downward. After the mixture is inserted the hole is plugged to prevent possible poisoning of stock. If posts are larger than 4 inches are used two holes are recommended with a proportionate increases in amount of material used.
