New Record Set By 1944 Oregon Sugar Beet Crop

Oregon's greatest crop of sugar beet all but a small acreage of which are grown in Malheur county has been harvested and growers are already planning to increase their plantings by several thousand acres to meet the 1945 food production goals the Oregon state college extension service farm labor office has been informed.

The Malheur county sugar beet crop is estimated at around 215,000 tons this year, some 10,000 tons higher than the previous record crop of 1942 according to county agent Ralph Brooks, he estimates about 13,400 acres were planted in the county this year while the states goal for next year as 17,000 acres.

Altho this year's per acre yield of beets was not as great as last year the sugar content is high. Acreage was increased by about 5000 acres over last year and nearly 1500 over 1942. The crop is expected to return between 2 1/2 and 3 million dollars to growers. Practically all of the beets were out of the ground by December 1, whereas two years ago some were being dug as late as the middle of January.

Sugar beets are one of four record breaking crops harvested in Malheur county this year. The largest onion crop in the county's history about 4000 carloads or approximately 3,200,000 of the 50-pound sacks, has been harvested, though adverse marketing conditions will probably prevent several hundred carloads from reaching markets. Brooks said. This year's 3500 acres tripled last year's plantings.

While this year's potato crop of 7500 acres is some 3000 fewer than in 1943 between 200 and 250 more carloads of spuds are expected to be marketed for another Malheur county record. This season's potato crop is estimated roughly at 2500 carloads. The 1944 crop graded higher than that of last year. Nearly two-thirds of the county's acreage was in early potatoes and the balance in late varieties.

Carrying the bulk of the additional farm labor in harvesting these crops were nearly 500 Mexicans and over 600 Japanese evacuees under contract to sponsor committees. In addition a considerable number of Japanese evacuees on indefinite or seasonal leaves were available.

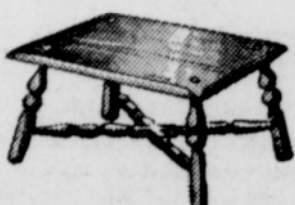
