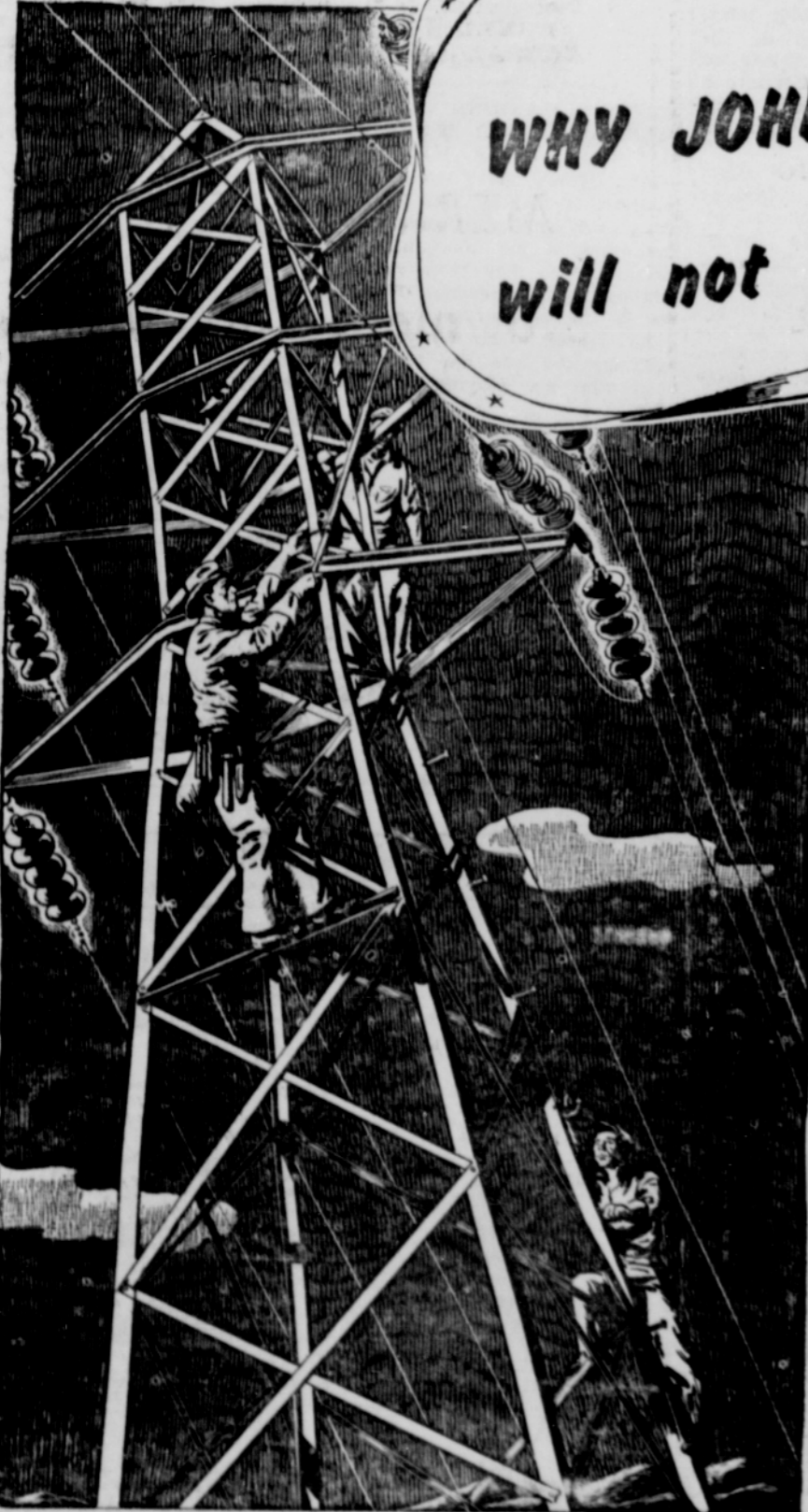

# WHY JOHN RAY AND HIS CREW will not be home for Christmas
