DOVER FARM HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE

The farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bunch in the Dover district was destroyed by fire about 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. How the fire originated is unknown. Everything in the house was destroyed, the family barely escaping with what they were wearing. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

Vital Needs for Lumber on Farms to Be Filled.

Altho increased military demands have necessitated tightened war production board controls on lumber distribution for civilian use adequate supplies are expected to be available for maintenance and repair of farm buildings and for new farm construction essential to production reports Robert B. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee.

Oregon has been allotted 5,309,000 board feet of lumber for distribution to farmers on AA-2 and AA-3 preference rating certificates in the first three months of 1945. The certificates are issued by county AAA committees for construction that will contribute to increased production of needed farm commodities. Among the permitted uses are repairs to farm dwellings costing less than \$200 and replacement of farm buildings destroyed by fire.

In issuing the certificates for lumber Taylor pointed out county committees give consideration to whether the use of the proposed construction is consistent with farm production goals. Since Oregon's 1945 poultry goals generally call for holding production at the 1944 level construction of additional poultry facilities in many cases would be considered unsound.

In 1944, 6497 farm lumber certificates for a total of 612 million board feet of lumber were issued by county committees in Oregon.

Labor-Saving Equipment to Be Shown in Counties

The series of farm and home labor-saving equipment demonstrations sponsored by the farm labor office of the OSC extension service will be started in Washington county January 26 and 27 with meetings at Sherwood and Forest Grove.

The schedule will be continued thru Marion, Linn, Benton, Clackamas, Multnomah, Polk, Yamhill, Columbia and Clatsop counties on dates to be announced later. Tentative plans also call for showing in Lane, Tillamook, Lincoln and Coos counties reports Clyde Walker, assistant in the state farm labor office and extension specialist in agricultural engineering.

These demonstrations will include both farm and home equipment using labor-saving devices that are designed to lighten the work of the homemaker as well as the farm operator. Field equipment will include such things as a manure loader, post hole digger, auto buckrake, tilt-top trailer and numerous smaller outdoor items.

Improved homemaking ideas will include the showing of a kitchen sink unit, mixing table unit, utility table and lap-board, laundry cart, and other items. Labor saving ways of ironing shirts will also be demonstrated.

County agents are in charge of local arrangements and they will round up in advance unusual labor-saving equipment designed and operated by farmers or home makers in their own counties.

HELPFUL HINTS FOR WINTER DRIVING

If you can't start your car in sleety, icy or rainy weather, it is too bad, but if you can't stop it in such weather that may be a real tragedy according to Secretary of State Bob Farrell.

In urging motorists to avoid accidents that may lay up automobiles because of irreplaceable parts as well as causing deaths and injuries, the secretary of state emphasized the increased traffic hazards as a result of winter weather conditions.

"While state and county road crews are doing excellent work in keeping our roads and highways in the best possible condition perfect road maintenance is almost impossible due to wartime conditions," Farrell pointed out. "Manpower shortage, material shortage and increased wear on roads in many sections of Oregon combine to increase the difficulty of first class road maintenance."

Farrell said the National Safety council's committee on winter driving hazards has found that reduced visibility and poor traction are the most frequent causes of accidents in winter time. The driver can do much to meet these hazards by keeping windshield wipers and defrosters in good operating condition by using chains on ice and snow and by driving with greater care.

"In the last analysis safe driving in winter is up to the individual since even perfectly maintained roads and perfect equipment will not prevent accidents if the man at the wheel does not do his part," Farrell emphasized. The state official listed these tips for safe winter driving.

Drive with others as you would have them drive with you. Use mass transportation whenever possible. You won't get a new car until months after Hitler, Hirohito and Co. have been disposed of.

If you must drive in severe weather, prepare your car as well as you possibly can, and set out determined to get to your job for our soldier's sakes.

Use tire chains on ice and snow, for safe stopping and forward traction.

Don't get too close to the car in front. Maybe his chains are in his garage.

Don't assume that wartime 35 is a safe speed on all surfaces. Make that your top and cut down to conform to road conditions.

Keep your windshield clear. Give the man behind you a chance. Signal turns and stops, and both of you will get to your jobs. The country needs you both and both your automobiles.
