Farm Labor Assistants Lay Plans For New Year

More women and children from Oregon towns and cities will be needed to harvest 1945 crops than were used this last year farm labor assistants from 16 Oregon counties agreed recently at a conference at Oregon state college.

Because of the continued drain of young men from farms and a possible tightening up on the number of Mexicans that will be available in Oregon local communities will remain as the main source of seasonal farm workers.

J. R. Beck, state farm labor supervisor in the extension service pointed out. He predicted even greater use of women, boys and girls from towns and cities will be necessary.

Full utilization of returning war veterans who desire farm work was suggested by W. A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture who pointed out that farm work offered many possibilities. He emphasized the need, however for individual attention to each veteran to assure placement in the proper job.

Army authorities have indicated that an increased number of war prisoners will be available for agricultural work it was reported.

Upon acceptance in the Nurse Corps, army nurses are commissioned immediately and receive basic training, including instruction in military procedure. They take long hikes with field packs, gas mask and helmet, and receive instruction in pitching a pup tent and in military sanitation.

MARCH OF DIMES HAS AGAIN STARTED

The fight against infantile paralysis is drawn to special public attention at this time each year, however, there is a group of women in this community who are waging a year around battle the dreaded disease.

In Clackamas county these home front soldierettes are led by Mrs. M. L. Larson of Oregon City, chairman of the women's division in this county. Mrs. Ruth Williams who has headquarters in Portland, is the regional representative for the national foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Mrs. Larson and her staff of volunteer workers are carrying on a year round fight against infantile paralysis in this area. Half of the money raised thru the annual March of Dimes stay in his section to provide aid required by polio victims regardless of age, race, creed or color.

Last year the state of Oregon was second only to the District of Columbia in its per capita amount raised thru the March of Dimes campaign. It is the hope of Mrs. Larson that during the drive January 14 to 31 this city will better its last year's average and that Oregon will again lead the nation.

Clackamas county's active women's division is ready if an outbreak of polio should strike here. By working with the health department and the local Parent-Teachers association the women of this community are prepared to give all possible aid to local medical and health authorities to provide funds, equipment and technicians wherever needed.

Mrs. Larson and her committee work in cooperation with state and county rehabilitation agencies in assisting handicapped polios to become self supporting.

Basil O'Connor director of the National Foundation, New York, emphasized again that no victim of polio should go without care because of lack of funds. If the funds in the local chapter are exhausted additional funds will be advanced by the foundation.

NURSES GET PRACTICAL TRAINING IN THE ARMY

It is not only on the fighting front that army nurses are needed to care for American soldiers. Army nurses are working hard in hospitals throughout the United States.

The treatment of a wounded soldier does not end with his evacuation from the battle front to the United States. He may still require weeks or months of care in an army hospital at home.

Army nurses work in surgical units only a few thousand yards from the front lines, in evacuation hospitals a few miles farther back, in general hospitals overseas, in hospital trains and on hospital planes and ships and in regional hospitals in this country.

The ill soldier must be nursed as well as the wounded man. A soldier incapacitated by disease represents a gap in the ranks until he has been restored to his unit.

Army nurses are doing everything possible for their soldier patients but 10,000 more of them are needed. Registered nurses can secure full information about joining the U. S. Army nurse corps by writing the Surgeon General, U. S. Army, Washington 25, D. C., or by visiting any Red Cross procurement office.

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AMERICAN DIETS REMAIN GOOD OUTLOOK REVEALS

Oregon homemakers may have to juggle their food items a bit more than formerly under the new ration restrictions but as far as total food supplies are concerned, the outlook is favorable thruout 1945 reports Miss Lois A. Lutz, extension specialist in home management at the national outlook conference in December where sessions were devoted for the first time to the outlook for family living.

People in the United States have been unique in having better diets in wartime than in pre-war years as a result of higher incomes, record wartime food crops, and increased production of protective foods, such as milk, eggs, fruits and vegetables. The quality of the American diet has improved considerably in the past 25 years according to records of the U. S. department of agriculture.

Increased milk consumption has meant more calcium, riboflavin and vitamin A, while greatly increased citrus fruit consumption has added more vitamin C. Victory gardens have improved nutrition with more green and yellow vegetables, which had their value enhanced by being consumed fresh out of the garden.

Enrichment of white bread and flour is estimated to have increased thiamin in the national diet by one-fourth, iron and niacin by one-fifth, and riboflavin one-seventh. A bill is before the Oregon legislature to make enrichment of white flour compulsory under state law.

An expected 5 to 10 percent decrease in meat supplies and of pork in particular will mean slightly less animal protein and some other food elements also as far as rationing is concerned many of the most nutritious part of meat animals are still unrationed points out Miss Lucy Cace extension nutritionist at OSC.

Homemakers can expect approximately the same total amount of milk and milk products in 1945. Total fruit and vegetable supplies may be down slightly but most Oregon families can assure themselves of plenty by having good victory gardens.

No one knows where, or how hard, polio may strike in 1945. Be ready to meet the attack. Support the March of Dimes.
