SOMETHING X-TRA IN EGG PRODUCTION

PORTLAND, OREGON—Wartime hens are responding to government appeals for increased production according to S. A. Cowan, 4430 N.E. Killingsworth Avenue. As proof he displays an egg weighing well over a quarter pound and measuring eight and one-half inches in circumference from end to end. This oversized egg was laid by a White Leghorn hen only eight and one-half months old—fed on Triangle X-tra Egg Producer and scratch.

Mr. Cowan not only reports production of larger eggs by his flock, but points to a remarkable laying record as well. One pen of 90 Leghorns have been laying from 80 to 90 eggs per day. Another pen of 225 birds are laying an average of about 220 eggs per day.

"I feel," states Mr. Cowan, "that Triangle X-tra Egg Producer is responsible for a large part of this fine egg production."

Women and Youth Fill Nearly Half Farm Jobs

Placements of women and children accounted for nearly half of the 181,682 farm jobs filled in Oregon in 1944 by county farm labor offices according to annual summaries from the several counties received by the OSC extension service.

A total of 54,791 placements of boys and girls and 25,248 placements of women, 44 percent of the total, were made in farm work for the year. Adult men placements, including Mexicans, Japanese and prisoners of war in addition to migratory workers and local residents totaled 101,682. Between 40,000 and 50,000 different individual workers were placed on farm jobs thru county farm labor offices according to estimates of J. R. Beck, state farm labor supervisor in the OSC extension service.

A total of 13,792 different farmers received help thru the county farm labor offices this past year. While most of the placements were for season crops, more than 3000 were year round jobs.

Beck also said that 12,330 investigations were made by county extension workers to obtain information for guidance of county war boards in making recommendations on deferments to selective service boards.

SIMPLE FURNITURE POLISH EASILY MADE

The simple mixture of two parts of boiled linseed oil and one part turpentine makes an excellent furniture polish according to Janet Taylor, home demonstration agent. She adds that the mixture should be used with plenty of elbow grease for satisfactory results.

The oil "feds" the wood and the turpentine loosens dirt and helps the oil penetrate the wood.

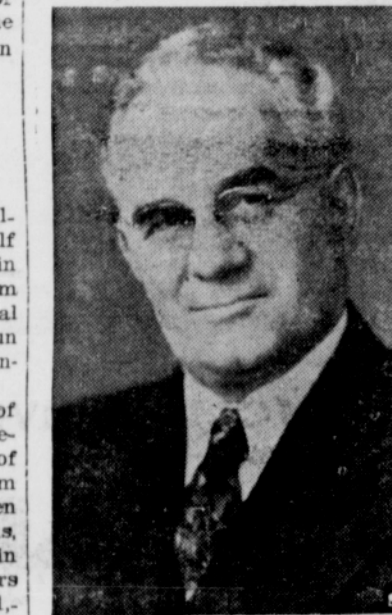
This polish removes the dull, foggy appearance that furniture often acquires, and helps conceal fine cracks or checks in the finish.

Apply the mixture with a soft cloth. Then with a dry cloth rub off excess polish and keep rubbing with the grain of the wood until the surface is entirely dry and will not show a finger mark.

Prexy Gives Students 'International Vision'



Narrow national horizons must disappear from the thinking of those preparing for tomorrow's peace is the belief of Dr. H. J. Burgstahler, who recently began his second five-year term as president of Ohio Wesleyan university, Delaware, Ohio.

To give Ohio Wesleyan students "international vision," the university will offer a course this fall on postwar problems, in which students, with the aid of experts in foreign affairs, will attempt to work out the best bases for peaceful relations between the United States and each of these five nations: Britain, Germany, Russia, Japan, and China.

Two national study conferences and a previous postwar course have given students a broad background for this year's study.

MAKE YOUR OWN BREAD AND ROLLS

Crisp, cool weather stimulates the desire for fragrant home-made bread and crusty sweet rolls. Contrary to popular opinion, good bread and rolls are easy to make if these few tips are followed.

Have the oven checked so that it registers the temperatures necessary for bread baking. Those homemakers who live beyond city gas



mains and have gas ranges served with butane or propane, will find that bread bakes more easily in gas ovens.

There is enough moisture to keep the bread from drying out, and still a hot enough heat to brown it evenly on top, bottom and sides.

Use your favorite bread recipe. After the bread has been baked, remove it from tins so that it doesn't become soggy. Sweet rolls should be brushed with lightly beaten egg and water to add a glaze appearance. If you desire soft rolls or bread, brush with melted butter or substitute before and after baking, and then cover with a fresh, clean towel while cooling.
