National Public Health Nursing Day, January 25th



PUBLIC HEALTH NURSES SERVING THE PEOPLE OF CLACKAMAS COUNTY

The Public Health Nurses have been serving Clackamas county for twenty-one years. They have been stretching professional nursing care as far as possible because one public health nurse can give part-time care to seven or eight patients a day and reach many more thru class and clinic.

In order to be a public health nurse, she must be a graduate from an accredited school of nursing, a recognized course in public health nursing and college study is advisable. All the nurses in Clackamas county have their college degree, meaning that she has spent five to seven years of schooling preparing to be in this special field of nursing.

Who Is Your Public Health Nurse?
Kathryn Rees is the public health nurse of the Milwaukie grade schools and junior high school. Kathryn Bisbee is the public health nurse of the Oregon City schools, (except Mc Loughlin and Trinity Lutheran schools.) Geraldine Betts is public health nurse in Milwaukie area including Kellogg Park and Hillside Park housing projects and carries on nurse supervision duties. Margaret Hoffman is public health nurse in the Malolia, Canby and Wilsonville areas. Agnes McConnell is public health nurse in the Colton, Oregon City, West Linn and Oswego areas. Angela Hearn is public health nurse in Estacada, Clackamas and Oak Grove areas. Bessie Woodmansee is public health nurse in the Damascus, Boring and Sandy areas. Each nurse's territory has approximately 20,000 people. The ideal population for one public health nurse.

What She Does

Public health nurses teach families how to take care of their own sick and save nursing and medical time for the most critical cases. Public health nursing service makes it possible for many people to be taken care of at home and so relieve the pressure on hospitals.

Like other registered graduate nurses a public health nurse aids in the treatment of sickness. But the public health nurse's chief concern is its prevention. She is both nurse and health teacher. She promotes not only the physical health of her patient, but his mental, social and emotional well-being as well. Because sickness is often closely allied to social or economic problems, she helps bring together all community resources needed for solving these problems. To do this she works closely with hospitals, health and welfare agencies, and many other groups. She is a respected community leader, and essential link in a total community health program.

More than 25,000 public health nurses are making 31 million visits a year to our people, in homes, clinics and classes, fighting diseases, teaching families the ABCs of healthful living, helping workers stay well and on the production line, giving skilled home

nursing care to men, women and children in all circumstances of life, in all sections of the nation.

War-time has brought even greater opportunities for service. Public health nurses are playing an indispensable part in nation-wide programs to control venereal disease, tuberculosis and care for infantile paralysis. They are helping to restore to health men rejected for military service. They are reducing pressure on hospitals by giving nursing care to people sick at home. They are helping bring thousands of extra babies into the world. They are answering the call for help from areas where overcrowding and lack of hospital facilities are most critical. They are guarding against possible epidemics which authorities warn may spread from war-scarred areas of the world. They are teaching bewildered families how to give the best possible care to soldiers in-validated home.

Prevention and cure of disease are two ideas of the same problem. They are not two separate problems. From the beginning, public health nurses have been concerned with the total health situation of the family including sickness, care, disease and prevention and health promotion.

Victims of infantile paralysis epidemics, this year the second worst in the nation's history, should have expert care and treatment, usually at home, if their muscles are to be restored to utmost usefulness.

In the fight against all sickness that menaces community health, public health nurses are the first line of defense. And yet the country as a whole has only 31,000 public health and industrial nurses. Today 826 counties, almost one in every four, and 28 cities are without public health nursing service. In our 36 counties three are without any nursing service and many others have reduced staffs. There are public health nurses in Oregon serving in various positions throughout the state.

The results of this war's Selective Service examinations have shocked the nation. That half of the first three million young men were rejected for general military service is a tragic commentary on the health record of the nation, but doubly tragic because many of the defects might have been prevented or corrected in

infancy or childhood.

The late Dr. William H. Welch of John Hopkins university once said that "America's two greatest contributions to public health are the Panama Canal and the public health nurse."

Public health nursing a very largely a 20th century development. During the past 30 years the number of public health nurses increased from 3,000 to more than 20,000 until today they outnumber any other professional group of the health field. Yet, if total nursing needs in this field are to be met, three times as many public health nurses must be made available.

Nursing service is needed to translate into practice almost every phase of public health. Child hygiene, maternity care, venereal disease and tuberculosis control, industrial hygiene and even home and community sanitation programs are only a few of the services which, if they are to function properly and effectively, must have the guidance and assistance of nurses.

Today we are dreaming of the postwar program which will bring health to all the American people. We have discovered in the course of the war effort the vital importance of the nurse in industry. We have presented to the public nurse each year new challenges for the application of her services to such problems as heart disease, cancer and other disorders of later life and in connection with the vast and increasing field of mental hygiene.
