Efficiency Ideas Reduce Labor In Caring For House

Homemakers can apply any of the principles worked out by efficiency engineers for saving time and labor in war factories says Miss Lutz, extension specialist in home management at Oregon state college. That many of them intend to do just that is indicated by the keen interest being shown by women in the labor-saving devices now being displayed and demonstrated throughout the state by the extension service.

Miss Lutz lists six principles that any homemaker may apply in reducing time and labor in taking care of a home. All may not want to follow some of these if they have plenty of time, but others are practical even under normal conditions.

1 Leave out any part of the task you can. Examples are: scaling dishes and draining in a rack without wiping, using sheets without ironing, and choosing recipes that require less time and fewer utensils.

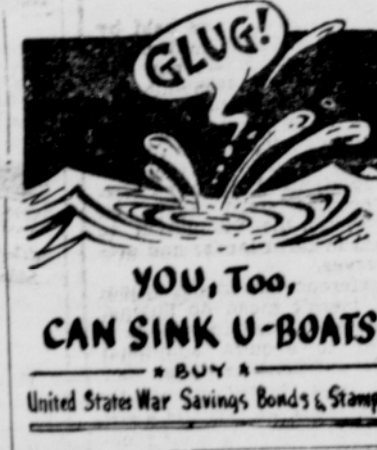
2 Make one task of two or more. When ironing pillowcases, handkerchiefs, and the like, fold as you iron. If using an electric ironer send several small articles, such as handkerchiefs thru at the same time. Where possible serve foods in the dishes in which they were baked, and serve meat and vegetables on the same platter.

3 Make both hands work. Such jobs as putting away dishes, setting the table and dusting can be done with both hands at once.

4 Keep everything within easy reach. Keep the coffee pot, coffee and measuring spoon or cup where the coffee is made. Group ironing equipment such as iron, clothes rack, hangers and basket as near the ironing board as possible.

Use the best tool for the task. Tongs save time and trouble in removing jars and glasses from hot rinse water, taking baked potatoes from the oven and lifting greens from the cooking water. A pastry blender saves time and effort in making biscuits and piecrust. A long-handled dustpan, if you can get it, prevents stooping and saves time.

6 Sit down to work whenever you can. Much ironing can be done as well sitting down as standing. A lap table saves much effort in preparing vegetables for cooking and canning.

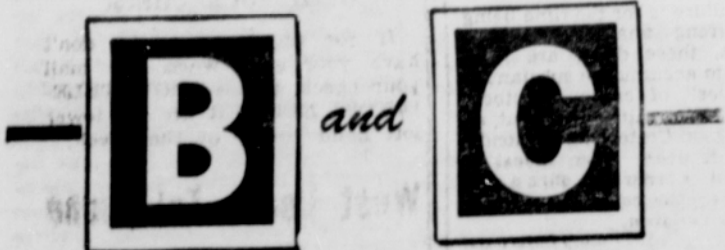
Bonds Over America
