His care-free feeling of peace and good will to all the world, evidenced by his manner of dress, has been disturbed; knee-length tattered and patched, multicolored material fashioned to serve only as a covering, could be referred to as his breeches; but held on uncertainly by a single shoulder string as to suggest that even they were not essential to ones happiness of heart, comfort of soul, or peace of mind. The red bandana handkerchief in his hip pocket hangs halfway to the heel of his chubby feet, from which the shoe of one has been lost or deliberately cast aside because of sand becoming packed in the toe and crowding the digits to the point of discomfort, or possibly a loose tack working upward to cause annoyance. desireable, and at the same time hold the friendship of one who had posted the sign; while some me, it was what to do with my truly American and Christian feeling that all Americans should be treated as such, regardless of creed or nationality, while signboards here and there proclaim that certain Americans, because of their racial antecedents, shall not only be hated, but ruthlessly robbed of their personal property and driven from their native land and home. Poor little bare-foot boy, you and I must learn the unwanted lesson that there is positively no extreme of unfairness, to which greed and selfishness will not go.

After a ride that rivals Paul Revere's, Caesar Rodney broke a tie vote in Delaware's delegation to the Continental Congress at Philadelphia on Lee's resolution for independence. Late on July 1, 1776, he arrived home after quelling a revolt in Sussex County where he received an urgent summons to Philadelphia. Mounting a horse, he rode through the night and arrived in the north ern city in time to place Delaware with the other colonies backing the resolution.
