It is available either as a label button or with a pin-back. The veteran is issued his button free of charge upon his discharge. If the button is lost or destroyed, another may be obtained at cost (seven cents) by the veteran on presentation of his discharge papers to the Quartermaster Supply Officer at the nearest post camp or station.

Argentine Alfalfa Seed Not Suitable In Oregon

Argentine alfalfa seed is not suitable for use anywhere in the central or northern states according to experimental data from all parts of the country reviewed by E. R. Jackman extension specialist at Oregon state college.

While few if any established seed houses in Oregon are carrying the Argentine seed some supplies are known to have been offered in this state says Jackman. Because of the scarcity and high price of northern grown alfalfa seed some farmers may be tempted to try some of the South American kind he says.

In Maryland under conditions somewhat similar to those in western Oregon, Argentine alfalfa showed 52 percent winter killing the first year compared with 14 in Nebraska, under conditions somewhat similar to those in eastern Oregon 80 percent of the Argentine alfalfa winter killed the first winter in the first instance while in Nevada plantings, that yields were not available. It winter killed so completely Grimm out yielded the Argentine sort 2 1/2 times in Nebraska.

Grower tests with Argentine alfalfa in past years made in eastern, western and southern Oregon have indicated clearly that this variety is not suitable for any part of this state Jackman warns.
