Mrs. G. W. Coats is in Portland caring for her sister Mrs. John Winchester.

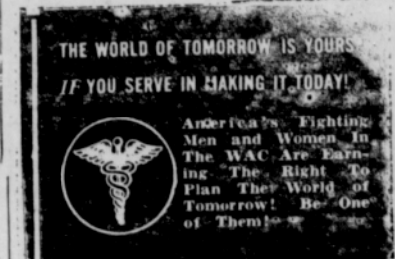
Mrs. Frank Rehberg is quite ill at her home at Little Sandy.

4-H Club Week to Help Bring High War Time Prices

In observing National 4-H club week, March 3-11, Oregon is helping to build the club program in this country in 1945 to what is expected to be the largest enrollment in history, reports H. C. Seymour, state club leader in the OSC extension service. Last years total of 1,700,000 4-H club members is expected to be increased to more than two million this year.

In Oregon where the proportion of club members to the total number of boys and girls of club age has consistently led the nation, special observances were arranged in each county with recognition and encouragement of club work given at meetings of granges, Farmers unions, Farm bureaus, parent-teacher groups, service clubs and local churches. Every club leader is receiving a copy of messages issued by President Roosevelt and Governor Earl Snell in support of the work.

"Your efforts must be carried forward with even more momentum in 1945," wrote President Roosevelt. "To this end may National 4-H Club week result in a rededication by all 4-H club members of their heads, hearts, hands and health, to full-hearted endeavor in all that makes for victory."

Governor Snell in his message to club members said: "All during the war Oregon has had every reason to be proud of these boys and girls as they have every right to be proud of themselves. The increasing food emergency only serves to increase appreciation at home and in the armed forces."

Oregon had an enrollment of club members in 1944 with expanded projects in food preservation and conservation. Every member who produced enough "food to feed a fighter" will receive a certificate of appreciation from the army quartermaster corps. Expanded work in such projects is the aim of all leaders in 1945.
