Copper Wire Tight for Farm Use This Quarter

Less copper wire will be available for farmsteads during the next three months than for any comparable period since a year ago, Oregon farmers are told by R. B. Taylor chairman of the state AAA committee.

Reflecting increased military demands the tighter copper wire situation will mean that fewer farms can obtain new electric connections for operation of irrigation pumps, livestock production equipment, the state chairman reported. He asks that farmers hold their copper wire requests to a minimum and that they postpone plans for new electric hookups until wiring is more plentiful.

The state has been allocated 11,900 pounds of copper wire for distribution on farmers' copper wire certificates issued by county AAA committees Taylor said. This allocation will have to last until June 10 and compares with 16,900 pounds for the past three months. Many county committees have applications on hand for more than the entire county quota.

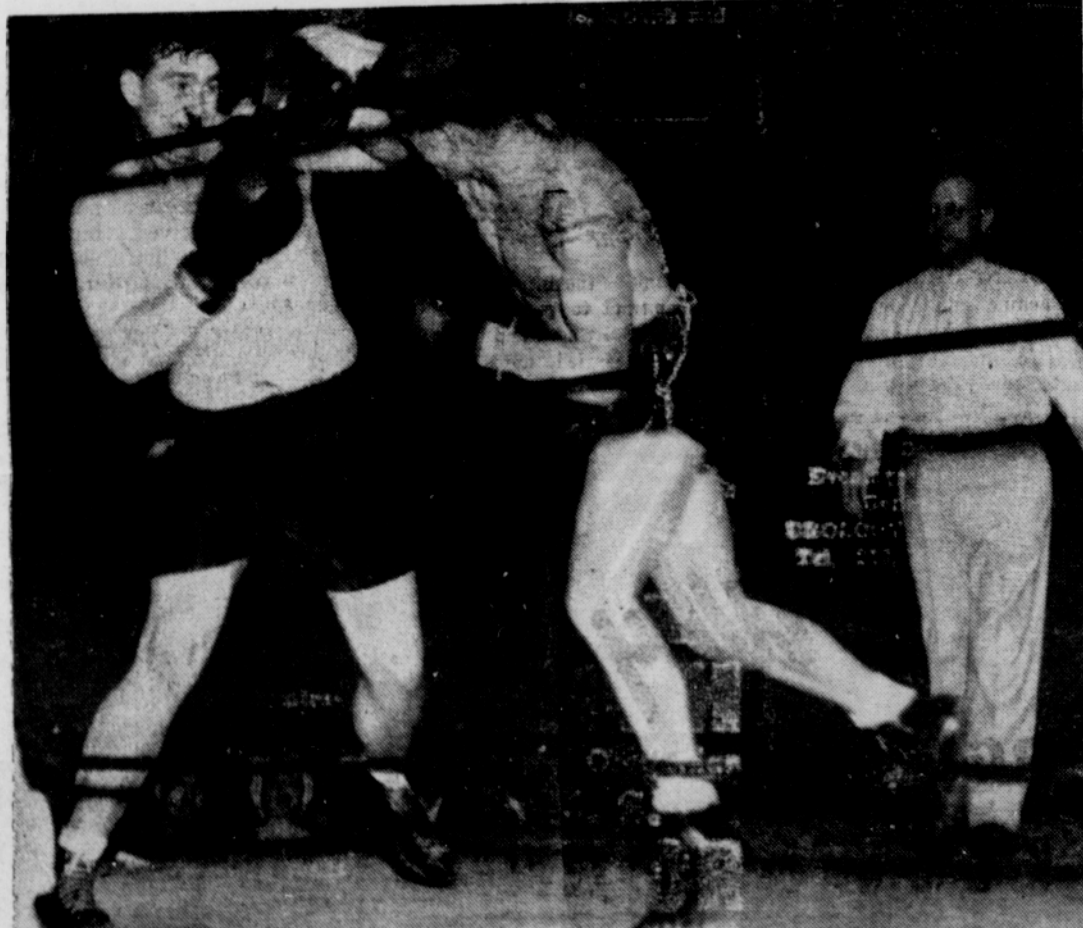
