REPAIR SCREENS NOW

Now is the time to get busy and fix up old screens before mosquito and fly season are here again says Janet Taylor, home extension agent. Chances are they will have to serve another year. The reason is that the military requirement for screen wire has increased for protection against malaria, dysentery and other insect borne diseases. Miss Taylor continues that metals will be used for these purposes and retailers are being asked to sell only a limited amount to any one household. Preference will be given to hospitals, schools and places where food is processed or sold.

In the meantime present screen can be repaired so they will last. First brush off dust and rust and look them over carefully for small holes. Then patch the holes with a small patch cut from an old screen that can't be used any more. After patching, paint the screens on both sides with screen enamel unless screens are copper or bronze. These need no treatment. Finally store them in a dry place where they can be protected from other articles that might poke holes in them.
