Corn Yield Tests Show Which Sorts Best for Oregon

Oregon hybrid No. 525 continues to be the highest yielding among all field corn varieties at the central experiment station at the Oregon state college according to latest figures compiled by Dr. R. E. Fore in charge of corn breeding and production work for the farm crops department.

This hybrid first obtained from Wisconsin, is now known as Oregon 525 because the seed is produced in this state. Several tests the latest made last season show there is no significant difference in yield whether the seed is grown in Wisconsin or here in Oregon.

For western Oregon hill lands such as predominate in Clackamas county, Oregon hybrid has given the best yields. For the warmer sections of the state with longer seasons such as Malheur county and southern Oregon, Oregon hybrid 695 is a later maturing variety which gives heavier yields under these conditions Dr. Fore reports.

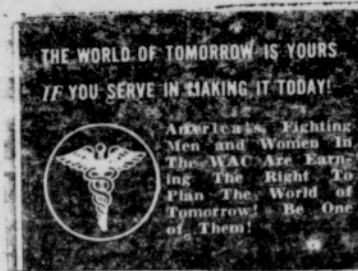
Following are average yields for seven years at Corvallis for the three leading hybrids and the leading open pollinated variety: Minnesota No. 13; Oregon 525, 55.2 bu. per acre. Oregon 570, 54.8 bu. Oregon 355, 48.8 bu., Minn. 13, 44.5 u.

A three-year average is now available for Oregon 100, a new hybrid actually developed at the Oregon station. It is now the earliest maturing hybrid available for this region says Dr. Fore, and is proving popular with growers who desire extra early maturity. Its three-year average yield at Corvallis is 50.6 bu.

Last years tests on seed source showed that Oregon grown seed of hybrid 525 yielded 61.4 bu. per acre compared with 60. bushels from seed obtained in Wisconsin. Other hybrids showed similar variations one way or the other so slight as to be not significant. Minnesota 13 seed from Washington county however, produced 49 bushels per acre compared with only 38.8 bushels from Idaho seed of the same variety.

A list of Oregon growers of certified hybrid seed together with brief descriptions of each variety are in all county agent offices or may be obtained from the farm crops department at the college.

NOTES FROM THE WAYSIDE

When Rex Jones, Jersey breeder of Marquam learned of the new circular "Building and Maintaining Fertility in Clackamas County Soils," he said, "this is just what I have been looking for. Ninety percent of us do not understand fertilizer formulas and we pay too much and purchase unneeded fertilizer elements as a result."

Rex, who is a great believer in fertilizing by top dressing pastures each spring with commercial nitrogen requested twenty copies for his neighbors. This circular, however, defines the different types of fertilizer explains the importance and use of organic matter and limestone, explains fertilizer formulas and how to use them and presents a table which evaluates different farm produced fertilizers.

Dave Jones, well known dairyman who lives five miles southeast of Oregon City was in town the other day and told us of the successful use of four acres of his alta fescue. Dave says that after harvesting a seed crop from this field in July it furnished excellent pasture for seven two year old heifers until the latter part of October.

Alta fescue is one of the few grasses which remains green during the dry summer months and Dave is using it extensively along with subterranean clover.

Speaking of pastures readers who find it convenient might well notice the excellent alta fescue and subterranean clover pasture on the Clairmont dairy farm just south of Oregon City at the junction of the Molalla, Beaver Creek roads, operated by Carl and Ernest Josi and the subterranean clover and perennial ryegrass sheep pasture on the Gilbert Hanson farm one mile north of Gladstone on the west side of the eighty second street road.

The latter was established by H-H clubber Gilbert Hanson Jr. who was a national garden club winner prior to entering the armed forces.

If the button is lost or destroyed, another may be obtained at cost (seven cents) by the veteran on presentation of his discharge papers to the Quartermaster Supply Officer at the nearest post camp or station.

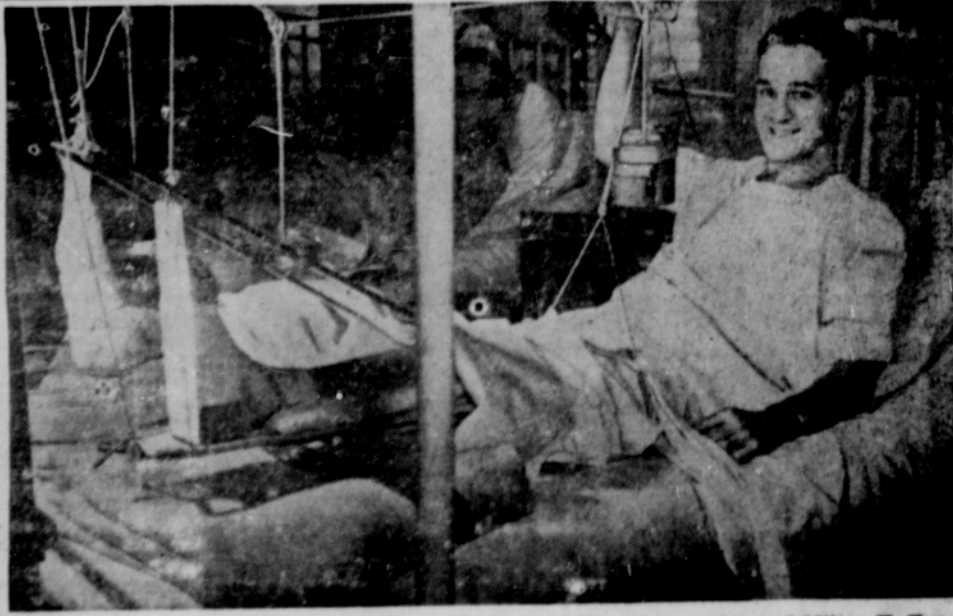
