Growers who in tend to plant seed flax this year are asked to report their intended acreage to their county committee so that a farm goal may be established. A support price of \$3 a bushel has been announced for flaxseed.

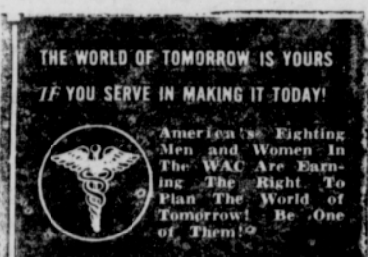
THE LOW DOWN
