DISCHARGE BUTTON—Representatives of the Army, Navy and Veterans Administration have decided to retain the discharge button which is given to all honorably discharged veterans of the present war. It is available either as a lapel button or with a pin-back. The veteran is issued his button free of charge upon his discharge. If the button is lost or destroyed, another may be obtained at cost (seven cents) by the veteran on presentation of his discharge papers to the Quartermaster Supply Officer at the nearest post camp or station.
