FARM GUIDE FOR VETS CONTAINS CO. REPORT

The selection and purchase of a farm is generally one of the most important business transactions in a farmer's lifetime and hence needs to be undertaken with full information, according to a new bulletin, "Farm Opportunities in Washington Co., Ore., just published by the O.S.C. extension service as bulletin 653.

The text of the bulletin represents the report of the Washington county veterans' agricultural advisory committee, which is one of 36 such committees prepared to counsel with returned veterans on farming opportunities in their respective counties. Most of these have reports for free distribution either in mimeographed or printed form.

The Washington county report includes information on recommended size of farm units, factors to be considered in part-time farms, and what to look for in a farm home.
