Sandy Gateway to Mt. Hood

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REA To Serve Mountain

The Northeast Clackamas County REA Co-op Inc., Friday received a special use permit for the right-of-way to construct transmission and distribution electrical facilities to serve the Mt. Hood area above Rhododendron from the U. S. Forest Service.

The local REA has already employed the services of a consulting engineer and they expect to start construction as soon as the weather permits in the spring.

As soon as the allotment is approved by REA headquarters, the local co-op will invite bids from contractors already interested in the project.

This power transmission and distribution line will be a big asset to our year around playground at Mt. Hood as the only power now on the mountain are small private generators of different types which cost a lot to operate and are always a source of trouble to maintain.

Vets Given School Credits

Two units toward high school graduation will be allotted all Oregon veterans returning from service, Hugh E. Rosson, director of the State Department of Veterans' Affairs, pointed out this week in outlining a program whereby service men and women may complete their secondary education.

A unit is the equivalent of one school year of study in one subject, and 16 units are required in Oregon for high school graduation. The awarding of two units for a veteran's basic training has been announced by the state department of education.

In addition, high schools may allow credits for training received in army or navy service schools, based upon an evaluation guide prepared by the American Council on Education. Here are further steps the veteran may take to secure the necessary credits for graduation:

1. Enrollment in full-time high school classes. He will be received the same as any other student, but if over 21 years of age may be subject to the rules covering payment of tuition as they apply in his particular school district.

2. High school correspondence courses. Information, and application, may be obtained by writing the General Extension Division, Oregon State System of Higher Education, Eugene. These courses are accepted by any standard high school in Oregon for credit toward graduation. The veteran is advised to consult his principal first, however, to avoid duplicating courses he may have taken before entering the service.

Because these courses are approved by the department of education, enrollment fees can be paid under provisions of the GI bill of rights. Courses offered by the extension division include all the required high school subjects in English, science, mathematics, and social studies, in addition to pre-flight, aeronautics, accounting and business English, mechanical drawing, and high school Latin and Spanish.

3. A combination of correspondence and regular high school work, if his principal approves. If the veteran needs, say, five units to graduate, he can clear four of these by one year of high school, and he may also complete his fifth unit by taking a correspondence course on the side. Principals and high school teachers have been asked by State Superintendent Rex Putnam to assist the veteran in his correspondence study problems.

4. Night school classes conducted in Salem and Portland.

5. Part-time attendance in regular high school, to fulfill individual graduation requirements. The veteran can get his best information on this from his high school principal, or from a veterans' organization in his home town.

BORING MAN ENLISTS IN ARMY

Oregon headquarters of the military personnel procurement service announced December 12, the enlisting in the regular army of John A. McReynolds of Route 1, Box 813, Boring, Ore. Private McReynolds attended Sandy Union High, where he was very active in 4-H and Future Farmers of America, and later entered the merchant marine for a short time. He enlisted for three years in the army air corps and will serve in Alaska.

Coyote bounties paid included \$22 to A. L. Heacock, Boring, for two carcasses and \$11 to Frank Linhart, Sandy, for one.

Nettie Connell, Ames, led the list of payees of bobcat bounties receiving \$10 for four cats. Linhart received \$5 for two bobcats, Vernon Dhooge, Oswego, and Percy Shelley, Sandy, were paid \$2.50 each on wildcat pelts.

SURPLUS PROPERTY RULES CHANGED

"What is the function of the Smaller War Plants Corporation," asks the returning veteran. "Can you tell me where I can get this surplus property?" "Do you buy it for me?" These, and many other questions of a similar nature flow into the offices of the Smaller War Plants Corporation each day.

The regulations governing the handling of surplus property were changed radically on October 15, 1945, and the function of various agencies defined.

The SWPC, for instance, is now a certifying agency, authorized to accept applications from the veteran who wishes to purchase surplus property for use in operating or setting up his own small business.

Smaller War Plants corporation does not handle or sell any surplus property, nor does it price, list, or catalogue such surplus property.

One of the main functions of SWPC has been, and continues to be, to aid and assist small business. In working with the veteran, SWPC regards him as a small business man with a priority. We want to help the veteran who is interested in getting into business for himself, but not as a speculator.

When a veteran applies to SWPC for assistance, he is required to show evidence of separation or terminal leave. He then fills out his application for the surplus property he needs to operate or maintain his own small business. The veteran will be mailed a certificate showing that he is eligible to purchase said property. Copies of this certificate are mailed to the proper disposal agency who in turn will notify the veteran when the property he desires is available.

The veteran has no further contact with SWPC, but deals with the Disposal Agency. In other words when the Disposal Agency notifies him that his property is available, he inspects the property and makes his selection.

The price, terms, credit and loan condition regarding any transaction is to be worked out with the Disposal Agency.

SWPC does not know what property is available, or where it may be inspected. All matters of this kind fall within the province of the Disposal Agency.

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Boring Has Big Fire

A bad fire early Tuesday morning completely destroyed the Marvel and Glasco Seed and Feed Store and Ma's Cafe at Boring and for a while threatened the house next door and surrounding buildings.

The fire was discovered shortly after 4 a. m. and was first combatted by Ray Lund, who owns the store and tavern across the street, with his own fire fighting equipment until reinforcements arrived. Those answering the call were the Sandy fire department, Gresham fire department and the Clackamas county fire truck.

The Sandy fire department again stole the show when Joe Yoerger, clad in the asbestos fire suit, climbed to the roof of the house which was on fire and succeeded in putting out the flames on the roof and helped keep the main blaze in the building dampened down. The house which also belonged to the Glasco and Manuel families, suffered apparently only slight damage.

The owners of the seed and feed company reported the loss as follows: building \$8,000, feed and supplies, \$12,000. The building was partially covered by insurance and the merchandise was one-third covered.

Mrs. Steensen, who operated Ma's cafe, was unable to estimate her losses, but said that the large refrigerator, stove and other equipment were completely destroyed.
