At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Sandy this day regularly called and held at the City Hall in said city, at the hour of eight o'clock P. M. with Mayor V. M. Alt, Recorder E. C. Leum and the following members of the Council, to-wit:

In attendance, the following business was transacted:
Councilman J. F. Yoerger introduced the following resolution, which said resolution was duly seconded, read and adopted by the following vote, the said resolution and vote thereon being as follows:

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANDY, CLACKAMAS COUNTY, OREGON, That the following proposed amendment to the City Charter of said city be and the same is hereby proposed for submission to the legal voters of the said city for their adoption or rejection at a special election to be held on the 22nd day of July, 1946, as in this resolution provided;

CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL

An Act

To amend the charter of the City of Sandy, in Clackamas County, Oregon, as adopted by the legal voters of said City of Sandy at a special city election held November 14, 1913, together with subsequent amendments thereto, and to amend all other amendments thereto enacted by the legislative assembly or by the vote of the people.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF SANDY:

That the charter of the City of Sandy, in the County of Clackamas, State of Oregon, duly adopted by the legal voters of the City of Sandy at a special city election held November 14, 1913, as amended by any amendments thereto enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people, be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto Chapter XVI to read as follows:

Chapter XVI

For the purpose of providing funds to construct a sanitary sewer system consisting of trunk lines, laterals, "Y's", "T's", together with all other connections or additions thereto as required by good engineering practice along or under the streets or public thoroughfares of the City of Sandy and along rights of way outside the corporate limits of said City of Sandy leading to a sanitary treatment plant; to construct a sanitary treatment plant, all in accordance with the sanitary regulations of the Oregon State Board of Health; to provide engineering and legal services necessary for and incidental to the construction of a sanitary sewer system and treatment plant, such system to be constructed in substantial accordance with plans and specifications now on file as the same may be changed and amended with the approval of the council.

The Common Council of the City of Sandy, Oregon, is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed Twenty-four Thousand (\$24,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of constructing a sanitary sewerage disposal plant, said bonds to be in denominations of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, or One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars each, to be signed by the mayor and counter-signed by the Recorder under the corporate seal of the city, having semi-annual interest coupons attached thereto, bearing the facsimile engraved signature of the mayor and recorder, whereby the city shall be held in substance and effect to undertake and promise to pay the bearer of each of said bonds at maturity thereof the sum named therein, in current lawful money of the United States of the present standard of value, with interest thereon at the rate of not to exceed four per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds to be fixed at a convenient time to be fixed by the council, maturity or maturities to be likewise fixed by the Council, but not to exceed twenty (20) years from date, principal and interest of said bonds to be payable at the office of the treasurer of the City of Sandy, Oregon, which bonds shall be known as "City of Sandy Sewage Treatment Plant Bonds, Series 1946."

Section 2. The debt limitations contained in the charter of said city shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized.

Section 3. The Common Council shall each year at the time of preparing the budget for city purposes include a special levy

in a sum sufficient to pay interest due on the outstanding bonds of this issue and to retire the principal thereof at maturity.

Section 4. The Common Council shall be vested with authority to fix charges for sewer services and collect therefor on a monthly basis, and said charges may be made and included with monthly statements for water services.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this resolution for proposed charter amendment submitted to the voters by the Council be filed with the recorder of the City of Sandy for submission to the legal voters of said city for their rejection or approval, to be voted upon at a special election to be held as herein provided:

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Common Council deems it advisable and does hereby and herein call and make necessary provision for the holding of a special election which shall be and hereby is called to be held on the 22nd day of July, 1946, between the legal voting hours of One P. M. to Eight P. M. on said date and that said time be and the same hereby is designated as the time for holding said special election, and the city hall in said city is hereby designated as the polling place therefor, and the following named persons are hereby designated and appointed as and for the judges and clerks of said election, to-wit:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the ballot title for the foregoing proposed charter amendment will be as follows:

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL:

An Act

To amend the charter of the City of Sandy as adopted by the legal voters of said City of Sandy at a special election held November 14, 1913, together with the subsequent amendments thereto, and to amend all other amendments thereto enacted by the legislative assembly or by the vote of the people, by adding thereto Chapter XVI, providing for an issue of not to exceed \$24,000.00 bonds of said City for the purpose of providing funds to construct a sanitary sewer system consisting of trunk lines and laterals leading to a sanitary treatment plant and to construct a sanitary treatment plant.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the recorder be and he is hereby instructed to publish the hereinabove proposed charter amendment submitted to the voters in the manner provided by law, that is to say, by publication of this resolution in full with the ballot title thereof two (2) times within the fifteen (15) days immediately preceding said special election in the Sandy Post, the official newspaper of said city and hereby designated for said purpose.

Notes by The Wayside

While attending the organization meeting of the Columbia sheep breeders at the farm home of E. J. Handley of McMinnville, we had the pleasure of inspecting Mrs. Handley's small green house in which she propagates flowers and grows a few tomatoes. This greenhouse, only 14 by 16 feet, has three or four huge tomato plants which were producing ripe fruit by the fourth. These plants are loaded with enough fruit to supply an entire family for the next two months; and, what is more, Mrs. Handley has hybrid tomato plants producing ripe fruit in the garden. This performance beats the New Hampshire Victor by quite a little.

The small amount of heat required is furnished by a small wood stove. An electric heater with thermostat might also serve this purpose.

Mrs. Handley sprays the greenhouse blooms with a hormone to promote early fruit setting, and also leaves the greenhouse doors open on warm days so bees can enter to pollinate the blossoms.

The writer also had a ripe tomato on a hybrid plant in the garden on July 6th but this one is from a blossom on the plant prior to setting out. The time may not be too far distant when ripening tomatoes, by the first week in July will be a common occurrence.

Plans for small greenhouses are available in the extension office at Oregon City.

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burn, the peas have scattered over quite an area.

It is possible, therefore, that we have a new legume for cut over areas in this pea; but we must proceed with caution, for H. A. Schoth of the Oregon experiment station tells us that these peas, which are yet to be positively identified, may, under certain unknown conditions, be poisonous to sheep and, possibly, to other farm animals. We expect to look into the matter further for, a good permanent legume is needed in areas such as this.

Circular of Information No. 382, recently issued by the Oregon experiment station, recommends the use of one pound of 50 percent wettable DDT to 25 gallons of water as a fly spray for horses and cattle. Approximately one-half gallon per animal is recommended for control of horn flies and horse flies. Effectiveness of control of deer flies, horse flies, and stable flies on animals is not known at this time; and reports of Clackamas county stock men indicate that DDT is not an effective control for the troublesome hefly. Ordinary horn flies do not usually bother cattle for a week or 10 days after one spraying.

The last report of project scientist Alvin Parker indicates that he has given woodland management assistance to 264 Clackamas county farmers during the past six months. Farm woodland involved in this report includes 13,680 acres from which the owners are selling sawlogs, pulpwood, cordwood for fuel, poles, biling and posts; where, at the same time, they are improving their stands because only the surplus is removed. This is encouraging for it indicates the growing interest in maintaining

CONFUSION REGARDING MILK SUBSIDIES

or not such payments will be made for the second quarter of 1946.

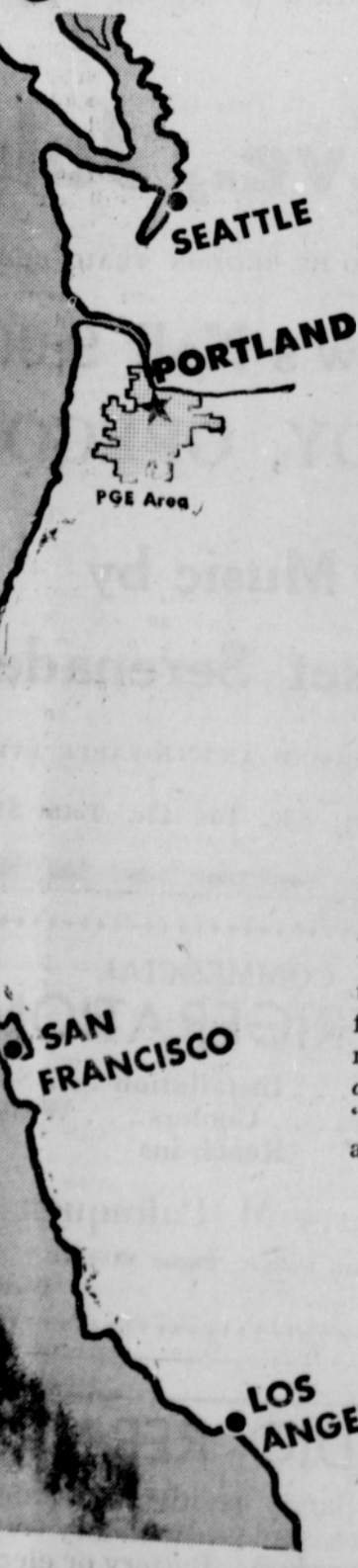
Applications are now being accepted for April, May and June subsidies on milk and cream sold

by producers. The final date for accepting these applications is August 31. Payment rates for April are 70 cents per cwt. for whole milk and 17 cents per pound for butterfat, and for May and June are 55 cents per cwt. for whole milk and 15 cents per pound for butterfat.

Applications have been mailed to all producers who received milk subsidy payments for the first quarter of 1946. However, any producer who has not received an application should call or write the county office, 607 Main street, Oregon City, informing the county committee of this fact so that he may be furnished another application. Applications will be accepted after August 31 unless accompanied by evidence showing that the cause of the delay was beyond the control of the producer. All receipts for the months of April, May, and June should accompany the application as only one draft can be issued for this period.

The Dairy Feed, Production Program ended June 30 and no provision has been made up to the present time for subsidy payments on milk and cream sold after that date.
