Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon, until the hour of 7:30 o'clock P. M. on the 12th day of August, 1946, and immediately thereafter bids submitted shall be publicly opened by the District School Board of School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon, at the Public School Building in Sandy, Oregon, within said School District, for an issue of bonds of said School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon, in the amount of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00), said bonds to be dated October 1, 1946, and to mature in numerical order as follows:

Said bonds to be in denomination of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars each, numbered from 1 to 80, both inclusive, interest thereon payable semi-annually on the 1st day of April and the 1st day of October in each year, and both principal and interest payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the County Treasurer, Clackamas County, Oregon, or at the fiscal agent of the State of Oregon, in the City and State of New York, U. S. A., at the option of the purchaser. Said bonds maturing after October 1, 1951, shall be redeemable at par, plus accrued interest thereon, by School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon, at its option, on any interest paying date on or after April 1, 1952, upon publication at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of contemplated redemption of one notice of intended redemption in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published within Clackamas County, Oregon, nearest to said district, and upon notification to the holders of the bonds intended to be redeemed.

The rate of interest which said bonds will bear shall be fixed by the successful bidder in the amount of his bid, but in no event shall said rate of interest exceed legal interest per annum. Said bonds shall be sold for not less than par and to the successful bidder; reserving, however, to School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon, the right to reject any and all bids submitted.

Said bonds were duly authorized at an election by the legal voters to said School District legally called and held on June 17, 1946, pursuant to the Constitution and laws of the State of Oregon.

All bids must be in writing and each bid submitted except when submitted by a state or government agency, must be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of five (5%) per cent of the amount of the bid made payable to the order of School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned upon the awarding of the bonds and the check of the successful bidder will be retained to be applied toward payment for the bonds or for the security of School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon, in event of the bidder's default. The successful bidder will be furnished with the opinion of Maguire, Shields & Morrison, attorneys, Portland, Oregon, that the bonds are binding and legal general obligations of School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon, or in lieu of such opinion the successful bidder may at his option secure an opinion from his own attorney at his own expense.

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CONSERVATION PAY ABOUT COMPLETE

About 75 percent of the 1945 payments for conservation practices have been completed to date. All applications have been transmitted to the state office for processing and the remainder of the payments will be completed soon. Payments for conservation practices completed in 1945 will total 85 thousand dollars.

A recent announcement has been issued that there will be no wheat marketing quotas nor acreage allotments during 1947-48 wheat production and marketing season. The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 provides for marketing quotas when the total wheat supply exceeds normal year's domestic consumption and exports by more than 35 percent, protecting both consumers and producers by maintaining adequate supplies of food.

Provision has been made to assure prompt movement of Oregon cover crop seed purchased by the government under the 1946 price support program for hairy vetch, Willamette vetch, common ryegrass, and crimson clover. The seed will be moved to outlets in the southern states as rapidly as it can be readied for shipment, but in event orders from that area lag behind purchases from producers here, arrangements have been made by Commodity Credit for storage in transit. Because of limited storage space here, prompt movement of the crop is necessary to avoid congestion in warehouses and cleaning plants.

Support prices under the purchase program are 12 cents for hairy vetch, six cents for Willamette vetch, 11 1/2 cents for crimson clover, and 7 1/2 cents for ryegrass. Seed acquired by the government here is sent to southern states for growing cover crops to protect farmlands from erosion.

CAMP ADAIR TO BE DISMANTLED

The abandoned buildings at Camp Adair near Corvallis, which at war-time peak housed some 70,000 soldiers, will be dismantled and allotted to the veterans' housing program, the Department of Veterans' Affairs was informed this week.

A letter from the War Assets administration in Portland, received by Marion County Service Officer H. C. Saffeld and passed on to Veterans' Affairs officials announced:

"The buildings at Camp Adair are presently assigned to the Federal Public Housing authority, Skinner building, Seattle, for dismantling in the veterans' housing program."

The letter added that the buildings at Camp Adair are assigned to the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, which is "working up a program of disposal at this time."

Another abandoned war-time project, the Salem airport, has been disposed of as follows according to the WAA disclosure:

"An interim permit has been given the city of Salem for use of the airport and eight buildings as operating facilities. Six buildings have been turned over to the state of Oregon, 36 to the department of agriculture, and the U. S. district engineer's office are removing the remaining 59 to civil works projects."

"When the civil aeronautics administration have made their report on the lands contained in Salem army airfield, and the same are classified as airport and residential or agricultural, final disposal will be made."

The information came from E. W. Barnes, deputy regional director for the office of real property disposal of the War Assets administration.

Notes by The Wayside

Bill Dietz of Canby has an exceptionally good field of flax this year which he attributes to the use of ammonium sulphate, 100 lbs. per acre broadcast and plowed under prior to planting along with 20 lbs. applied at seeding time. Bill says that the twenty pounds was just enough to give the plants a start and that he broadcast this application by hand while riding the drill, facing backward, at seeding time.

A simple rat trap designed by E. V. Lindros, carpenter in the physical plant carpenter shop at Oregon State college, is said to be effective because it is open on all sides and does not, therefore, excite the rat's suspicion. This trap is fashioned after those seen by Mr. Lindros in his native Finland where the wisest rats are caught after other traps and poisons fail. The trap works on the principle of a falling weight which kills instantly. The weight is a two by twelve about a foot long and suspended at a height of about six inches so it should not be dangerous to humans. We do not guarantee the trap's success since we have not seen it in operation; but those interested can obtain information in Circular No. 385 "An Effective Home-made Rat Trap," available at the extension office at Oregon City. We are anxious to learn of the success in controlling rats from anyone using this or what he may think is a better trap. The field is wide open.

Raising sheep is a good old Clackamas county custom; and now it seems with the advent of good pastures, that raising beef cattle may also become a profitable pastime. Whether we

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finally settle down to raising breeding stock or to fattening steers on pasture, or both, remains to be seen; but Clackamas county now has a few very good beef herds, and their owners are planning a Clackamas County Hereford show at the fair at Canby next month.

Among our purebred Hereford breeders are Jack Kasser of Clairmont, Walter Fisher, Carus, Oliver Gerber, Logan, Freeman and Son of Molalla, and Elvin and Jimmy Shibley of Springfield, who owns two good, white face heifers. Edwin Reid of Clarks has purebred Shorthorns and Kenneth Hall of Hazalia has a fine bunch of Aberdeen Angus heifers which he recently purchased from Dick Richards, former superintendent of the University brand experiment station and now manager of a large Angus spread at Prairie City in Grant county. We understand that Reid has arranged for use of the Angus herd bull owned by Oregon State college. Development of these beef herds is something to be watched with interest in the years to come. Hope we have not missed mentioning any beef cattle breeders; if so, we shall probably hear from them!

There's nothing new under the sun, so they say; but the self-powered mowing machine on Dan Keeney's place at Marquam is new so far as the writer is concerned and will, no doubt, be of interest to farmers generally. Day mounted the motor from a standard make combine on a home made truck in front of a power mower of another make. Wheels from the combine are used to carry the motor which furnishes the necessary power. This arrangement makes a complete mower unit with separate cutter bar power.

Advantages of such an arrangement are two: First, the tractor and mower are attached in a matter of seconds, whereas much time is lost in attaching and detaching the ordinary power mower. Second, the cutter bar speed is independent of the tractor speed.

Because of last week's east wind, tomato blight, which has been conspicuous by its absence around these parts this year, may soon be expected to put in its initial appearance. It comes the east wind causes tomato blight? Well it doesn't exactly, but tomato blight virus is carried by certain leaf hoppers insects native to the country east to the Cascades, ride the east wind to the Willamette valley and transfer the disease by biting our tomato plants, a number of other garden plants as well.

No known cure for tomato blight exists; so, if you see the garden shortly and find a few choice tomato plants looking sickly with leaves curling and turning yellow and leaf veins turning purple, just pull them up and hope that no more than 10 percent are affected.

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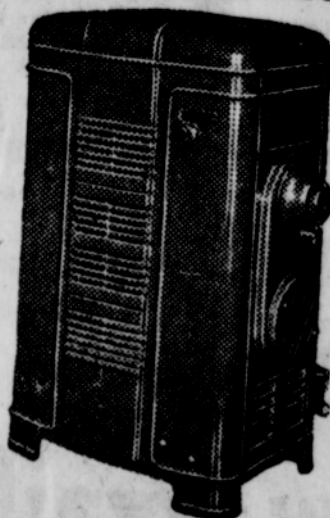

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1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
2. Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may reenlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
3. A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.
4. Up to 90 days' reenlistment furlough with pay, depending on length of service, with prescribed travel allowance paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who reenlist.
