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Tree Pruning Is Explained by Horticulturist

Thinning wood on a tree is very similar to thinning a row of corn according to C. O. Rawlings, extension horticulturist, who recently appeared for a series of tree pruning demonstrations in Clackamas county.

As you thin the plants in a row of corn, Rawlings says, you provide space enough for the corn plant to grow and sunlight, which is used by the leaves to manufacture food.

So it is with a tree. Each twig on a branch must have adequate space and sunlight to bear a crop of fruit. By pruning one branch at a time, like hoeing one row of corn, pruning is easy and systematic.

Pruning of fruit trees is necessary to remove all dead or weak limbs, overlapping branches that exclude sunlight and sucker growth, according to Rawlings. A general thinning out of some small growth will prove helpful in opening the tree up for sunlight and air.

Pruning cuts must be made flush without leaving stubs, so that chances of decay setting in are minimized. Cuts the size of a half dollar and up should be made about two weeks after pruning. A mixture of raw linseed oil and commercially prepared Bordeaux mixture is very satisfactory for this use.

The younger girls are the most enthusiastic about the long dresses. This is natural because they have never worn them and it is a new experience. The best rule, still, for anyone to follow is wear the length most becoming to you.

Skirt Too Short?

Here is a suggestion or two for lengthening hem lines. Frequently this can be done at the waistline. Mid-rif yokes are good and these may be of faille, belting ribbon, or even contrasting wool for wool dresses.

If a suit jacket is long enough, the skirt may be let down with a yoke, which does not show. This is especially good when the original material cannot be exactly matched. Large seams or extra material for enlarging the hipline is necessary when the skirt is dropped from the waistline. If there is no way to lengthen the skirt and the separate jacket is in good style, it may be combined with a woolen dress or a stripe in a contrasting new skirt.

Rows of machine stitching, decorative braid or fringe are ways of ending the old hem line which stubbornly remains after careful pressing.
