Greenhouse Management Discussed in Circular

Income from Oregon-grown greenhouse cut flowers and potted plants is valued at approximately \$2,500,000 annually, states a newly revised O. S. C. extension circular, No. 499, "Greenhouse Management." Copies of the circular are available through the county extension offices in Oregon City and Gresham.

The booklet covers greenhouse construction, heating, temperature, soil mixtures, fertilizers, seed treatment and the transplanting of plants.

At least 25 counties of the state have a minimum of one commercial greenhouse, but 80 percent of such greenhouses are located in the Willamette valley in the vicinity of Portland.

Guide Requirements Are More Strict; Fee Up

Stricter regulations governing the issuance of angling and hunting guide licenses will be enforced beginning Feb. 1 as a result of action taken by the Oregon State Game Commission at its last meeting. C. A. Lockwood, state game supervisor, announces.

Not only will applicants for guides have to comply with certain minimum requirements but it will also be necessary for them to pass a written examination given by game commission agents in the field before a license will be issued.

The last legislature granted the Commission additional discretionary power in the issuance of guide licenses and also increased the license fee from \$3 to \$15.

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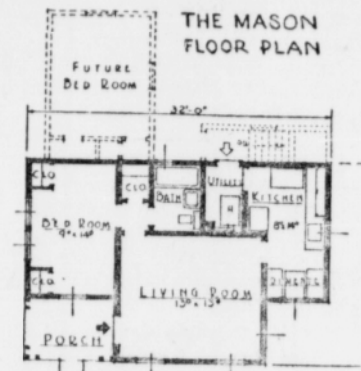

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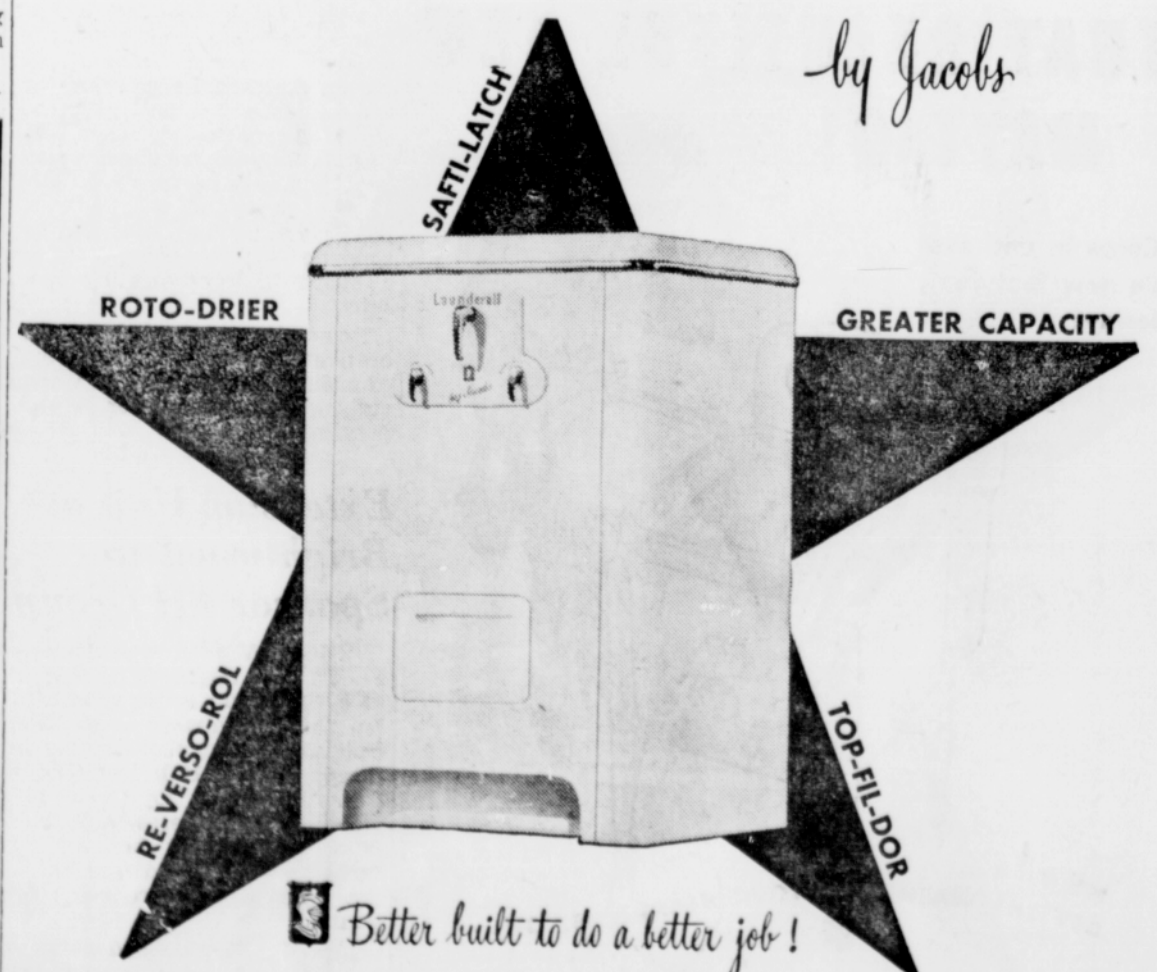
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
