Third Quarter Rally Isn't Quite Enough

Silverton's Foxes dumped Sandy high's hot and cold basketball squad on the Sandy court last Friday night to the tune of 35-33.

The visitors took over from the word go and first quarter and half-time scores were 15-8 and 22-12, very much in their favor. The Pioneers were rarin' to go when they came out of the dressing room for the third period, tied the count in short order and looked as though they'd go on to win. Big Jim Dyal began the rally's hit parade with a field goal, followed by Doug Gomoll, who was good for 4 more points, and Jack Williams, who swooshed three straight goals to tie the ball game at 23-all.

But the rally faded as the visitors tightened up and the third quarter count was 34-27 in Silverton's favor. Silverton's two aces, Roger Tofte and Roth, fouled out in the final period and for a time Sandy hopes were again riding high as the margin closed to 33-34. Then Williams' fifth foul was called and the resultant free throw was good.

Trofte and Williams were high scorers with 16 and 14. Sandy's JV lead all the way to win the preliminary, 35 to 27. Wilder and Cawvey were high for Sandy.

State Sets Up Strawberry Plant Grading System

SALEM — Official grades for Oregon-grown strawberry plants have been established by the state department of agriculture following a hearing here and became effective Jan. 26. The standards were requested by growers as a step in improving quality of strawberry plants.

The grades apply to plants of the Marshall variety and to others of similar characteristics. They do not apply to the everbearing varieties.

Two grades are set up: Oregon No. 1 size A and Oregon No. 1 size B. Both must comply to requirements concerning condition and freedom from pests and disease.

Size A plants must have not less than 14 main roots at least four inches in length and the minimum crown diameter must be at least five-sixteenth of an inch, measured at the base. In addition, at least 50 percent of the plants must have a minimum crown diameter of one-half inch and must have at least 25 main roots.

Size B plants must have not less than 14 main roots at least three inches in length and the minimum crown diameter must be one-fourth inch.

Copies of the complete standards may be obtained from the state department of agriculture, division of plant industry, Salem.
