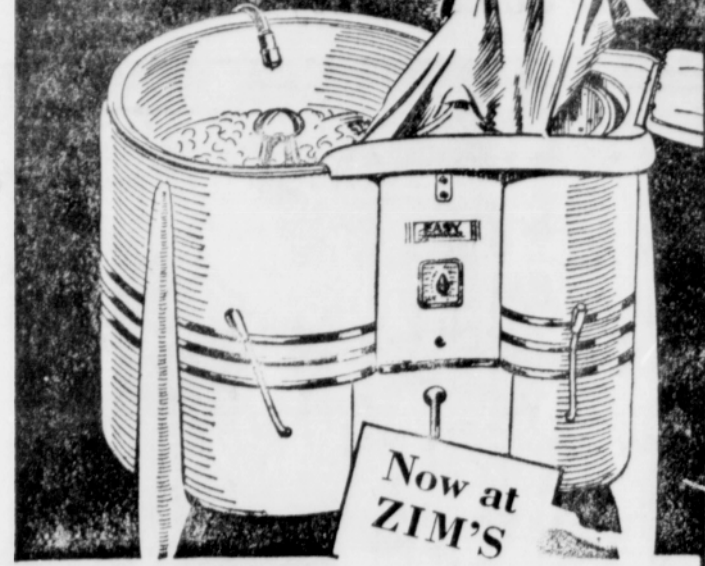


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Outdoor Cooking Class Is Formed by 4-H Girls at Eagle Creek; Meet Saturday

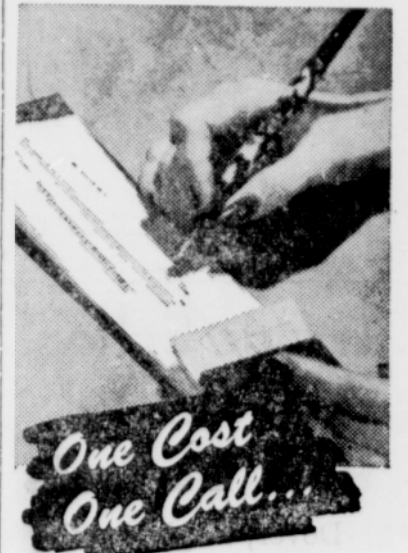

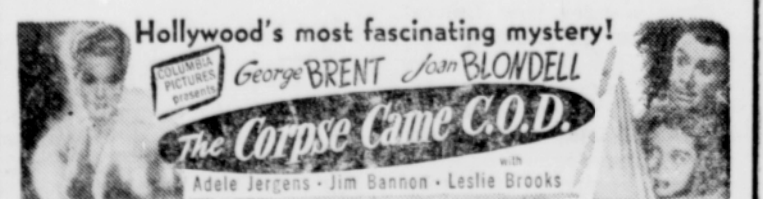

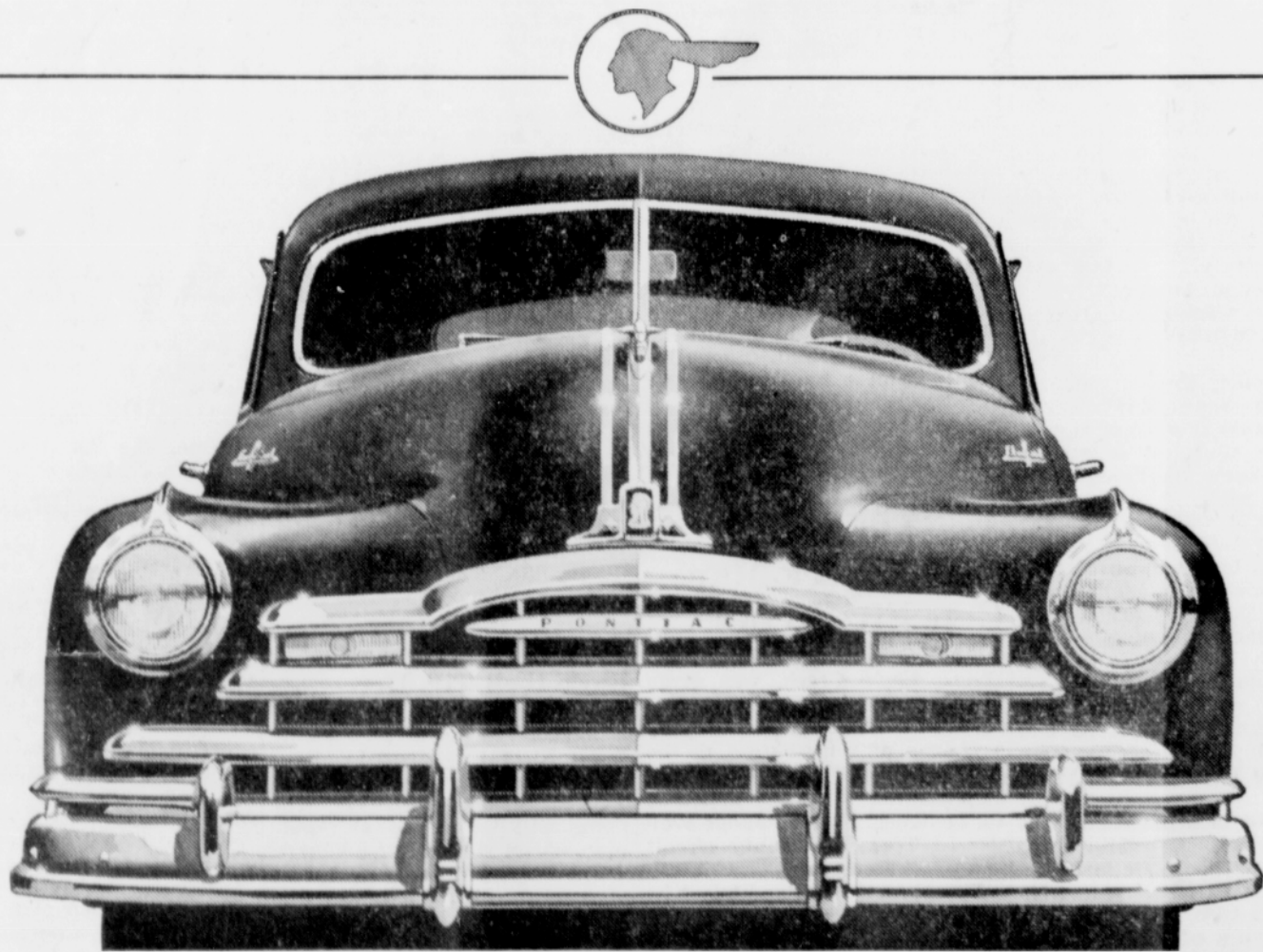
