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## "NOTES BY THE WAYSIDE"— Inskip Discusses Housing Cows, Firwood Area Soil Deficiencies

Are dairymen overconfining their cows during winter months? Discussion during a meeting last week of Clackamas county's dairy outlook committee, headed by Vernon Hepler of Canby, indicates that such may be the case. Some beef cattle raisers find that their cattle do better outside than in the barn.

Ed Eastman, Jersey cattle breeder of Needy, said he was forced to have his cattle outside more than usual during the winter of 1946-47 while building a new barn.

Said he: "I found to my surprise that my cows were healthier and produced better than when constantly confined to the barn."

Harold Ewalt, extension dairyman, then remarked: "Did you ever consider the fact that the six highest producing Jersey herds in Oregon receive very little housing. In fact, cows from one of these herds have to ford a river to the pasture all during the winter months. They get pretty muddy while tramping the lanes to the barn at milking, but production is at a maximum."

**Need Pasture**  
Rognar Anderson, Colton dairyman, then added: "I think the idea of leaving the cows outside more than has been the custom is a good one provided they have ample pasture while they are out."

This method of management would obviously result in considerable saving of labor, but members of the committee pointed out that it is adapted only to farms of good drainage with pasture fields of ample sod which are not cut up with winter tramping.

Everyone agreed that winter green pasture would be essential to such a program and that young stock should have ample dry feed and dry shelter to be used as the animals desire it. Anyway it is something to think about. Observations of other dairymen in Clackamas county,

pro and con will be gratefully received for comment in this column.

**Firwood Soil Problems**  
Among recent callers were Giles W. Palmer and his son, Buddy, from Firwood. Buddy is an Oregon state college freshman in the school of agriculture and Sandy high F.F.A. graduate. We discussed the Palmer alta fescue and sub-clover plantings, future plantings and soil difficulties. The latter we attributed to soil phosphorus deficiencies, a common Clackamas county problem. Giles says that he first obtained his pasture ideas from Grady Bollinger who lives just north of the Palmer farm on the old Cherryville road.

**Roots and Sub Soil**  
We do not often reprint from other publications but here are a couple of ideas from a national farm magazine which are worth more than passing notice. The editor of the magazine notes that he was called for saying that plant roots do not extend deeper than six inches. He notes also that most of the roots, that is small feeder roots, are found in the first six inches, but that every farmer knows that most grain crops have roots which extend to a depth of from four to six feet.

Such plants as alfalfa and sweet clover extend much farther and we believe the same to be true of our harder grasses. C. J. Willard, Ohio State university agronomist comes along with the statement that such plant roots are the most powerful tools for breaking up the subsoil. The point is that subsoiling machinery does not leave roots in the subsoil for permanent betterment. We can well use more of our grasses for subsoiling.

**Lessens Drouth Effects**  
The second idea concerns lessening effects of drouth by deep fertilization. We used to think that we could not use commercial fertilizer to increase production of late potatoes in Clackamas county because of the absence of adequate rainfall during July and August would mean insufficient soil moisture for making fertilizers effective.

Now, as every good Clackamas county late potato producer knows, application of high grade complete fertilizers below potato seed pieces at planting time makes his crop appear to be irrigated.

Now come officials of the Missouri experiment station with the announcement that similar applications of complete fertilizers at depth—four inches below plow sole depth—are responsible for normal corn yields even during serious drouths.

When machinery becomes available for placing mineral fertilizers when and where we need them we will be on the verge of a new agricultural era.

**NOTICE OF SCHOOL ELECTION**  
In the Rural School District of Clackamas County, Oregon. Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution. Notice is hereby given that an election will be held Monday, April 19, 1948, by the Rural School District of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, in said component school districts of said Rural School District. The election will begin at 8 p.m. and will be held in the schoolhouse in each of said component districts. The purpose of the election is to submit to the legal voters of the rural school district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1948, over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI of the Constitution.

The reasons for increasing such levy are:  
The sum of the bases of the component districts of the Rural School District became the base for the Rural School District. The low bases (in many instances no base at all) held by the component districts made for an inadequate base for the Rural School District, making it necessary for the Rural School District to vote to exceed the 6% limit.

The amount of tax, in excess of the six per cent limitation proposed to be levied by the rural school district of Clackamas County, Oregon, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1948, is \$248,442.48.

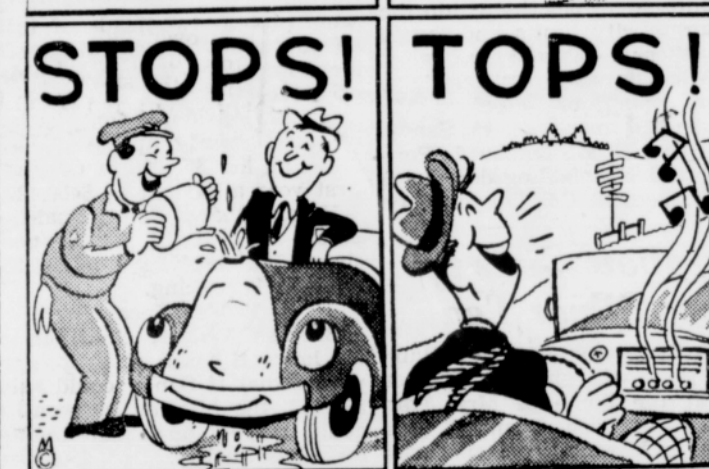
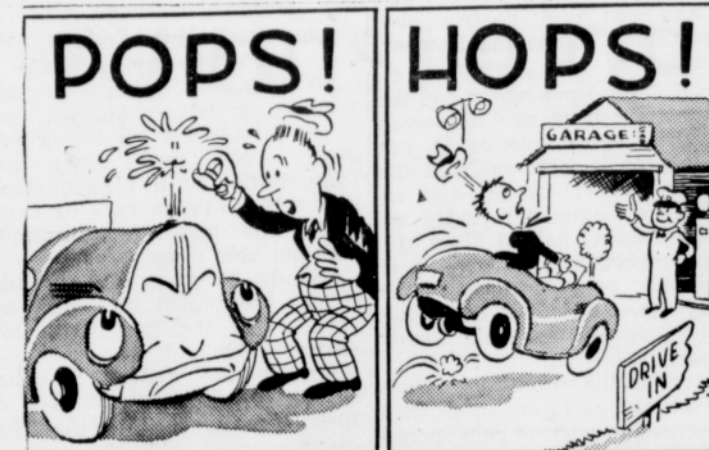

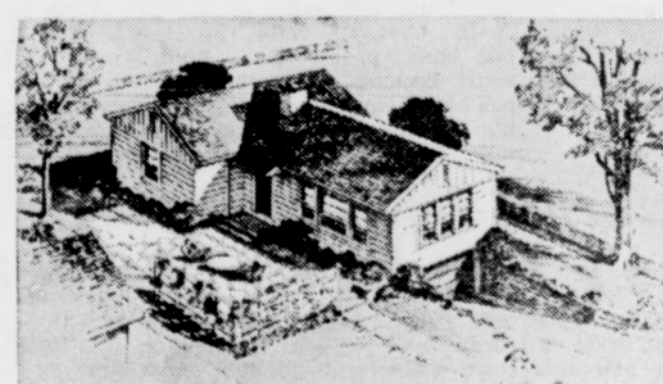


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
