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JUSTICE IN UNITED STATES—

An interesting and unusual example of the extent to which the courts of this nation go to guarantee and "just and fair trial" of those brought before them was given in Portland last Monday. It is worth noting as a reminder to all of us of the difference between justice in our free democracy and so-called justice in totalitarian states.

The event transpired in United States district court with Judge Claude McCulloch on the bench. The incident was the granting of permission by Judge McCulloch to the defense attorney to examine in open court of a witness who had appeared before the grand jury which returned the indictment and to question that witness about what went on in the grand jury hearing. Grand jury hearings, it should be remembered are legally secret sessions and hence Judge McCulloch was literally bending over backward to insure justice when he granted the defense attorney's plea.

The questioning was for the purpose of establishing whether or not the indictment had been turned upon evidence which previously had been held by the court to have been illegally obtained. Unfortunately for the defendants, it was established that only legal evidence had been submitted to the grand jury and hence the motion to have the indictment quashed was denied.

The point however, is that in this illustration of American justice the court permitted no technicalities to stand in the way of insuring a just and fair trial.

GREAT MEDICAL VICTORY—

The recovery in Portland recently of Geraldine Barney, 11-year-old Terrebonne girl, from botulinus poisoning suffered last November was a great victory for medical science. It is reputed to be the first known recovery from such poisoning.

The effective treatment of physicians and hospital attendants is considered all the more remarkable because of the fact that

an autopsy performed on Geraldine's father after his death from the same cause disclosed toxin so powerful that one-fifty thousandth of a drop was sufficient to kill. Both suffered the poison attacks after eating a meal which included canned corn and sausage.

Oregon has 16,000 more persons employed in March this year than in March of 1947. Looks like the state still is having no trouble in absorbing the influx of newcomers who have made Oregon the second most rapidly growing state in the nation.

While this talk about highways and bridges is so prominent it might be pertinent to suggest that completion of the Cascade highway from Sandy to the Columbia river and construction of a bridge at that point is worthy of serious consideration by the planners of Oregon's roads and bridges.

The boys up in eastern Oregon staged quite an argument before the interim legislative committee on highways recently as to where a bridge over the Columbia should be located. Wouldn't it be a good idea to get together and be sure such a project is definitely sold first and quibble about the location later?

It may have its inconveniences and discomforts, but nevertheless a snowstorm like that we had the first of last week is not without some compensation. At least, it gives us a variety of weather and serves to remind us of how fortunate we are not to have snow up to our bellies six months a year and temperatures below zero along with it, as they do in so many parts of the country.

Beaverton recently became the fourth town in Washington county to adopt the city manager form of government. The others are Hillsboro, Forest Grove and Cornelius. Perhaps Sandy isn't ready for it yet, but it wouldn't do any harm to keep in touch with the results of that type of government in other communities, especially when it apparently is succeeding in so small a place as Cornelius.

Some things, at least, are getting back to normal. Winter travelers say they are having no difficulty in finding plenty of places to stay, even in southern areas where winter travel naturally is the heaviest. If that knowledge gets around, it may start out a considerable new batch of tourists who have been holding off until they could travel without the worry of where they would rest their weary heads at night.
