

Where's That 'Gone Fishing' Sign? Trout Season Opens This Saturday

Bait or flies? Dark eggs or light ones? The Deschutes river or the Upper Clackamas and Sandy rivers?

The general trout season for Oregon opens Saturday, and that's the talk among wayfaring anglers this week. All of it is enough to make the spring-cleaning minded housewife look over

her list of chores and pigeonhole the ones reserved for the stronger back of the man of the house.

Exceptions Pointed Out

Attention is called to some exceptions in the general opening, according to C. A. Lockwood, state game supervisor. The trout season in tidewater areas will not be open until June 15 he re-

minded. He called attention to other exceptions listed by counties in the angling law synopsis now available at license agencies. "The game commission this season is opening as much water as possible on the one date and still conform with a sound management program. This is being done in the hope that it will spread the opening day pressure more evenly over the waters of the state," the supervisor said.

Legal Length Limits

The legal length limit is again

6 inches except in the lower parts of the Umpqua and Rogue Rivers, coastal waters and drainage basins tributary to the Pacific Ocean, and waters tributary to the Columbia River below the north city limits of St. Helens. In these waters 8 inches is the minimum length limit. A 10 inch minimum length limit has been set for Diamond Lake, the Owyhee reservoir and the Owyhee river below the dam.

Salmon season opens again in the coastal streams that were

closed during March and April with the exception of the Wilson river, which will open only below highway 101, the Trask river, which opens only below Highway 101 and the Nehalem river which opens only below Mohler bridge.

The season for Spiny-Rayed fish opens in Oswego lake on May 1. With the exception of Klamath county which has a closed season on black bass during May and June, the season for these fish is open all year in other waters.

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Last Rites Held For C. A. Edwards

Charles A. Edwards, 62, rt. 1, Boring, died following an accident last Thursday at the Dovedermid Lumber company near Boring. Mr. Edwards fell from a pile of lumber and though it was a fall of a few feet, he died shortly after arrival at a Portland hospital.

Services were held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon at Jacobson's Gresham Funeral Home. Interment was in the Sandy cemetery. Dr. George W. Bruce conducted the service. Pallbearers were E. C. Sorensen, J. C. Schmidt, J. T. Cottingham, Francis Flinn, Clarence Melton and Roy Steenson.

Mr. Edwards, who was born in Miltonville, Kansas in 1885, was married in 1910 to Louanna Thomas at Wathena, Kansas. Most of his life was spent in Kansas, where he farmed. They came to the Boring area about four years ago and Mr. Edwards had been employed at the lumber mill, one and a half miles southwest of Boring.

Survivors are his widow, Louanna; and sons, Charles F., of Sandy; James M., of Spokane; and Albert C., of Los Angeles. A brother, Frank E., of Home, Kansas, also survives, as do six grandchildren and one great grandchild.

A son, Gary, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Valberg last week.

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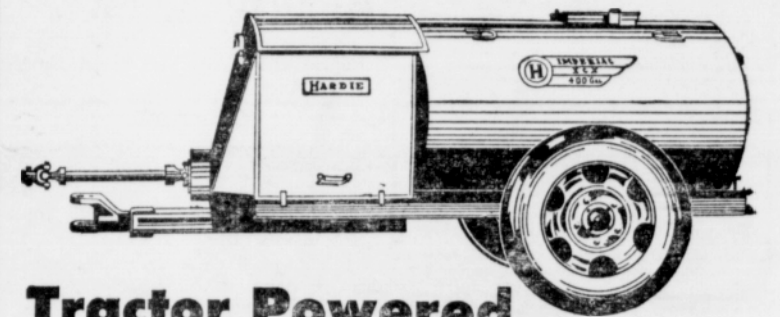
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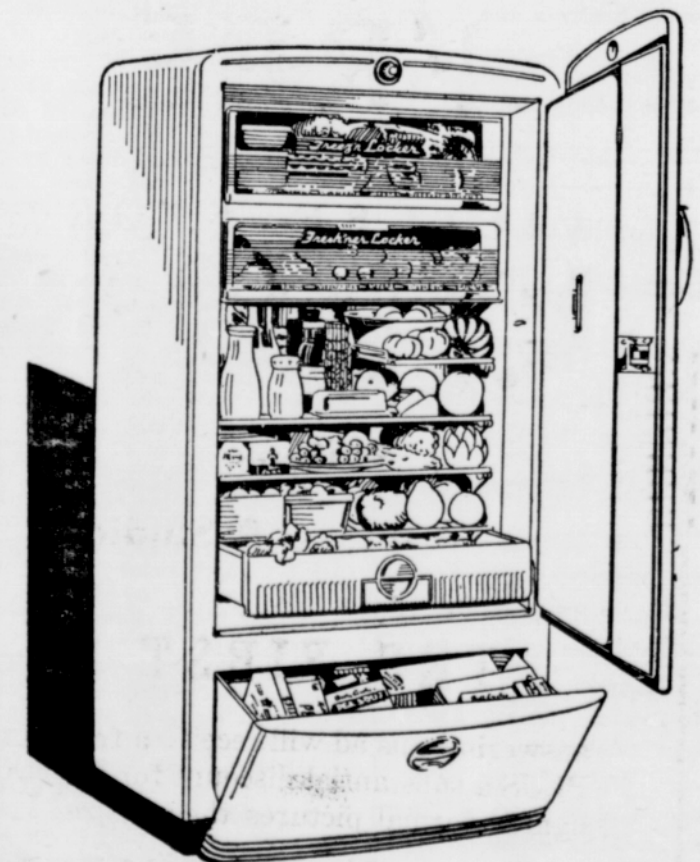
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
