GI Home-Builders Need Approval of Health Department

Veterans building homes with G.I. loans were warned this week that they must obtain approval of the county health department on plumbing, water supply, sewage disposal and electric wiring before work is done on these installations.

This action has been taken by the Veterans Administration, loan agencies and state board of health because of numerous complaints from veterans about faulty installations, according to Dr. Eugene J. Maire, acting county health officer.

Dr. Maire says that no more loans will be approved until the plumbing installations have been approved by the state board of health and water supply and sewage disposal facilities have been inspected by the county health department. He declared that existing installations must be uncovered for inspection before approval can be given.

In a letter to The Post, Dr. Maire asks home-builders to keep the following points in mind:

1. Is an ample, safe water supply available?
2. Are soil conditions good for adequate waste disposal?
