Townies Go Down to Defeat 6-4 In Opening Game With Silverton

King Lauderback or Bob Bell will probably start on the pitcher's mound for the Sandy town team this Sunday, according to Coach Bob Medley. The Townies take on Sublimity here at 2:30 p. m.

Things were not rosey for the home nine last Sunday when they played their Willamette Valley league opener against Silverton on the Sandy high school diamond. The Townies lost 6-4.

Prayers for rain to call the contest after the fifth frame (when the Townies led 4-3) went unanswered. Silverton pushed home three runs in the seventh to win the ball game.

Elliott, playing center field for Silverton, made the first run of the ball game in the first inning.

The Townies came back in the second with scores by Ed "Moose" Schmitz, first baseman, and Jack Nash, third baseman.

Wally Scales, center fielder, scored for the Townies in the third frame after getting on base with a double. Schmitz brought him in with a single.

Jack Nash scored again in the fourth inning. He beat a throw to home. Umpire Eldon Mills called him safe. But Nash was injured. He dove for the plate and sprained his shoulder while sliding along on the top of the clay. Sandy led 4-1.

In the fifth, Silverton began to get underway. They scored two runs. The final blow to the Townies fell in the seventh when Silverton tapped Hurler Bob Bell for four hits and three runs.

King Lauderback went in for Bell in the eighth and Silverton did not score again. But neither did the Townies.

Exam Due July 12 For West Point, Annapolis Cadets

Young men in the Sandy area who wish to apply for appointment in 1949 to Annapolis or West Point should notify Congressman Walter Norblad in writing by June 15 if they wish to take part in a qualifying exam to be given July 12.

Candidates for the naval academy must be not less than 17 years old nor more than 21 on April 1, 1949, unless they have served in the armed forces for one year, in which case they must be not more than 23.

Candidates for the military academy are eligible from 17 to 22, unless they have served for one year in the armed forces and then they may be 23.

Candidates for both academies must never have been married.
