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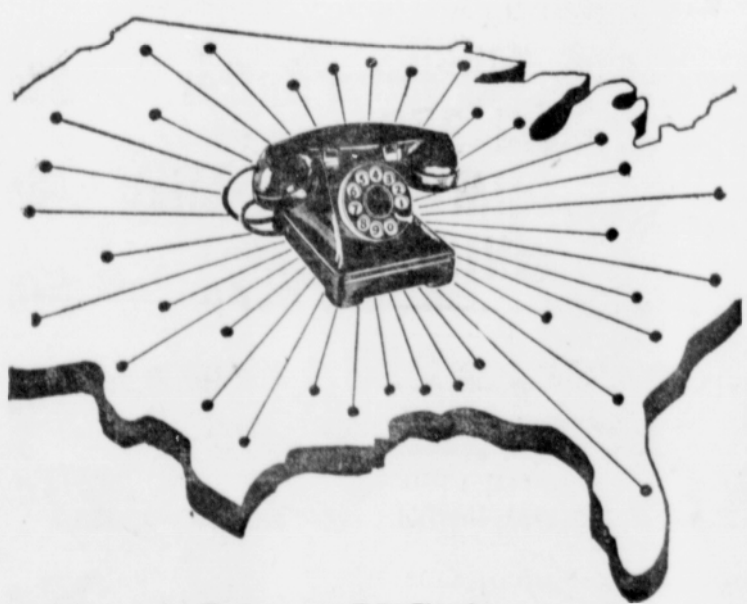

**How Did Marmot
Get Its Name?**

How did the Marmot district
northeast of Sandy get its
name?

According to Lewis A. Mc-
Arthur in his book, "Oregon
Geographical Names," it came
about this way:

"Adolph Aschoff, for many
years a forester and guide
about Mt. Hood, settled at the
present site of Marmot on
March 16, 1883. He found an
abundance of peculiar burrow-
ings, especially in the fern
growth near the borders of the
timber.

"Local residents told him
that these holes were dug by
marmots, but Aschoff deter-
mined otherwise, and found
that they were made by the so-
called mountain beaver, or Ap-
lodontia rufa.

"When the post office was
established Aschoff and two of
his cronies decided to call the
place Marmot on account of
this error. One of these friends
of Aschoff's was an old miner,
Fauntleroy S. Peake, who be-
came first postmaster about
1886. Aschoff became post-
master in 1891."
