AAA Farm Plans Filed by 1400 County Farmers

GLADSTONE — Final tabulations show that 1424 farm plans were filed in the Clackamas county A.A.A. office by May 1, the final date for filing conservation intentions this year. Total value of intended practices is \$112,000 dollars. Since the county allocation is only \$56,000, a guaranteed payment will be set at 50 per cent of the total value of intended practices on each farm plan. In addition to the guaranteed payment, the money set aside for intended practices which are not completed, will be distributed on a pro rata basis to those who complete their practices up to the total value approved by the county committee. Conservation practices include lime, phosphate on legume and permanent pastures, green manure on open cropland, permanent pasture seeding and weed control with chemicals. Much interest has been shown this year in control of Canadian thistles by use of chemicals.

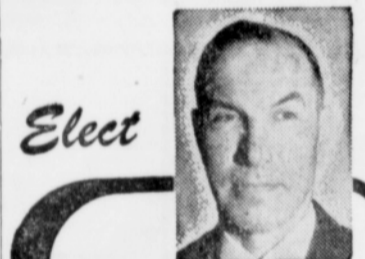

Sudan Grass May Be Best Bet for Extra Hay Crop

Sudan grass will be the "last chance" pasture or hay crop seeding possibility on much land in western Oregon where rains prevented planting of other crops last fall and this spring, observes E. R. Jackman, O. S. C. extension specialist in farm crops, who says that seeding time for Sudan grass will be about June 1.

Although Sudan grass is not the best forage crop, planting it may prove insurance against possible hay and pasture shortages later, Jackman pointed out. As a hay crop, Sudan grass compares well with spring grain. As a pasture crop it will not give nearly as much feed as alfalfa or red clover for example, but it will furnish green feed during the hot, dry summer months.

Most of the Sudan grass crop grown annually in western Oregon is used for pasture. It grows vigorously during the normally dry months of July, August and September. By pasturing it during these months, barn feeding of livestock is reduced. A good stand will provide about 75 days of pasture with a carrying capacity of two cows per acre.

The so-called sweet Sudan from Texas appears to be a definitely superior type seed, Jackman emphasizes.

Products harvested from the Clackamas county farm forestry demonstration project are marketed principally as sawlogs, fence posts, small round products, fuel, pulp, piling, poles and medicinal herbs and roots, reports the author of extension bulletin number 662, entitled "Farm Forestry in Clackamas County."

The bulletin written originally by Walter M. Ferguson while he was project farm forester of the demonstration area has now been revised by Alvin L. Parker, present project forester, and Charles R. Ross, O. S. C. extension forester. Copies are available from county agricultural agents' offices or direct from the college.
