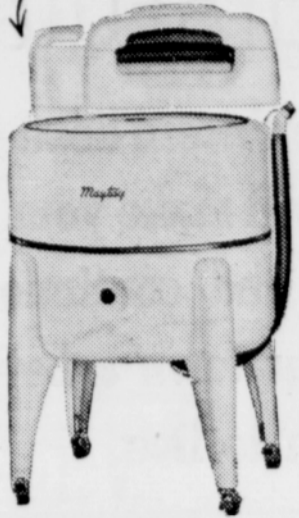

Sandy Town Team Loses 14-Inning Thriller to Sublimity, 5 to 6

Center Fielder Snyder stole home to score the winning run for Sublimity as the Sandy Townies went down to defeat Sunday afternoon to the tune of 6 to 5.

Snyder's run broke a 14-inning deadlock as the Townies took it on the chin for the second time on their home diamond. It's no wins and two losses for Sandy in Willamette Valley league play. The lead see-sawed back and forth in the early innings. Sublimity started things off with two runs in the first frame, but Doug Junker and Kenney Stone came back in the Townies' half with a run apiece to tie the game up, 2-2.

Sublimity scored in the second frame and again in the fourth. Catcher Duane Eliason came through for the Townies. He got on base with a fielder's choice and scampered home on an error in left field. The score at the end of the fourth was 4-3 in Sublimity's favor.

Sandy took the lead in the seventh. Junker got a single and was forced to second when a pitched ball hit Kenney Stone. Dave Bell brought Junker home with a hit, and Wally Scales drove Stone in with another single. Sandy led 6-5.

But Sublimity scored again in the eighth to tie up the ball game.

King Lauderback retired from the mound for Sandy and Bob Bell took over. In the next six frames Bell fanned 12 Sublimity batters. But Sandy could not score.

Sublimity got to Bell in the fourteenth. They chipped up three hits in that inning. Two men were on base and there were two outs. Snyder on third beat the pitch to home to give Sublimity the chance that they had been waiting for.

Sandy went down one, two, three in the last of the fourteenth to give Sublimity the ball game.

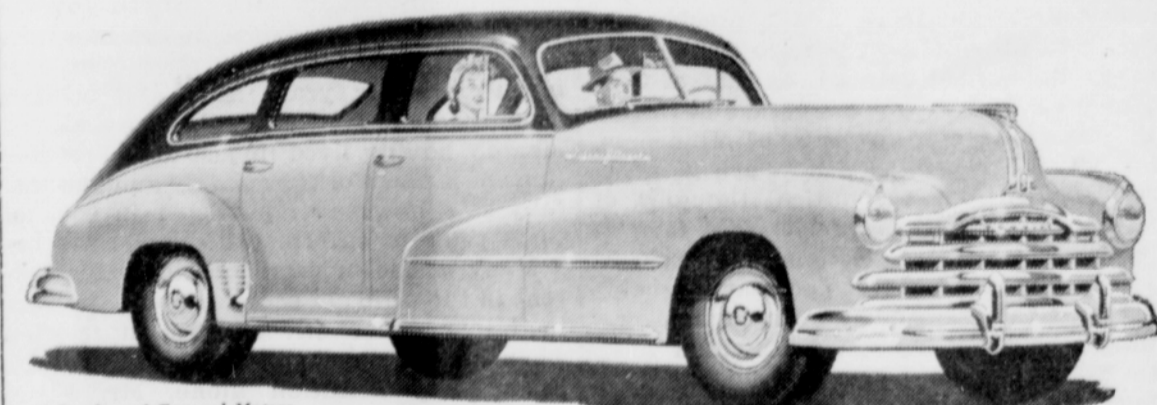
