**Veterans Are Urged
To Record Their
Discharge Papers**

The value to veterans of recording their military discharges in the county court house was poignantly brought out by the recent Vanport disaster, where hundreds of these documents are presumed to have been lost, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs said this week.

For those veterans who had recorded their discharges, there should be no delay in applying for GI benefits or other rights to which they may be entitled, because photostats may be obtained easily from the county recorder. These are bona fide copies and can be used for virtually all occasions where proof of military service is required.

Those who neglected to have their discharges recorded will find it necessary to apply for a certificate in lieu of lost discharge, which usually results in considerable delay because the applications must be processed in Washington, D. C.

There is no charge, in any county in Oregon, for recording discharge certificates, and veterans are urged to take advantage of this service because it provides a permanent record of military duty and makes it easy to obtain copies when circumstances demand swift service.

**County Court Sets
Eagle Fern Aside
As Public Park**

OREGON CITY—The Clackamas county court last week declared Eagle Fern park, 80 acres of virgin timber along Eagle Creek north of Estacada, a public park forever.

The court's action makes official the generally accepted status of the heavily wooded area which the county took over from the Bear Creek Logging Co. many years ago on tax foreclosure proceedings.

Also the court issued a resolution of public appreciation to the Dwyer family, logging operators in the Clackamas river district, for setting aside a considerable roadside stand of first growth timber just east of Eagle Fern park as a permanent arboretum.

Dwyers Thanked

Acting for citizens of the county, the court thanked Anthony, Robert and Edwin Dwyer, operators of the Southeast Portland Lumber Co., for their "co-operation and public spirit in allowing this bit of nature to stand along market road No. 40, to be enjoyed by all who may pass."
Installations which will improve sanitation, provide drinking water and otherwise improve the park for picnicking are planned by the court.
