The 4-H Club's Camp Colton will open Sunday afternoon, William P. Hinckley, Clackamas county club agent, said this week. Camp Colton is situated on the Springwater-Colton highway near Colton on a site sometimes called Lutheran Springs camp.

Highlighting the camp will be a stage showing of the latest scientific discoveries. The boys and girls will see model rocket planes travel 500 miles per hour, see music carried on a beam of light and hear rocket engines roar.

This show will also be open to fathers and mothers of 4-H members and their leaders if they wish to come Tuesday night, July 13 at 7:30 p. m.

Hinckley said there is still room for more campers. They are asked to notify him, if possible, if they are coming but if they can't get word to him to come anyway bringing plenty of bedding, camp clothes and a good appetite.

photography course should bring their camera because Dr. Curtis Ried of Oregon State College, the instructor, wants only those with cameras in the class, said Hinckley.

'Recreational' Courses Halted for Veterans

WASHINGTON — Several GI training courses listed as avocational or recreational were eliminated last week from the list of courses for which the veterans administration will pay expenses hereafter.

Eliminated were dancing, photography, bartending and mixology (drink mixing), personality development, entertainment, instrumental and vocal music, public speaking and sports and athletics.

The administration said it will continue to pay the customary subsistence allowances to veterans already enrolled until they complete their courses, but that no new enrollments under the GI bill will be approved.
