Jerry Lawson is spending the week with his sister and family, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse James at Sandy.

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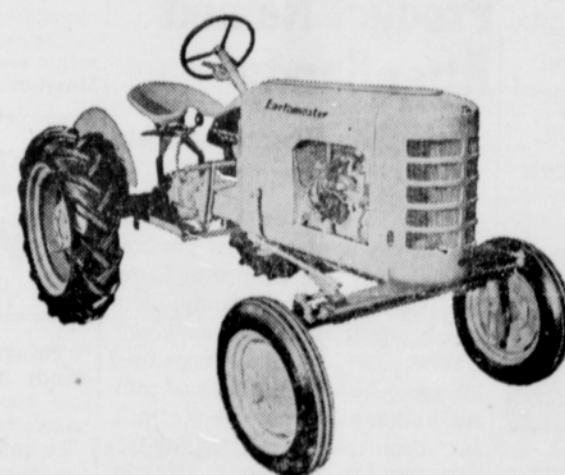
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
