Mrs. Thomas is the former Maggie Bell, who was born in Dundee, Scotland, on May 24, 1876, and came to the United States with her parents, James and Susan Bell, in 1877. The Bell family settled in the Eagle Creek community, later moving to the Garfield district.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas were married on Dec. 24, 1900, and made their home on their farm at Bull Run for 46 years, where they were affectionately known as "Uncle Asa" and "Aunt Maggie."

Mr. Thomas served as road supervisor for several years during the time when good roads were a local rather than a county or state problem. They took an interest in good schools and other community projects. His brother, the late Mack Thomas, donated the present site of the Bull Run school. Mr. Thomas was master of the Sandy Grange for 16 years and made his influence felt. Mrs. Hanser said that the highest compliment paid them was by her father, the late Louis Vaeretti, who said "They were good neighbors, none better."

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When Lanterns Lighted Horses' Path

Guiding a team of horses down Lusted hill by the light of an oil lantern was a daily experience in her life as a young bride, recalled Mrs. Ara Lusted, 1941 queen, as she reminisced with friends at the Sandy Pioneer picnic Sunday.

The Lusteds, former residents of Mabery valley, first settled in a log cabin atop Lusted hill. There they planted an apple orchard which still remains on what is now a Portland water department storage area. Later they moved into the valley and built a home.

Land Cleared by Hand
"We cleared 40 acres by hand," recalled Mrs. Lusted, "and Mr. Lusted built the road (which was named after him), leveling it by eye."

City and county engineers have left it on the levels established some 50 years ago.

Lusted school, which was also named after this pioneer family, could not be started until a certain pupil quota had been reached. "They had to wait until my son reached the age of 5 to fill

the quota," said Mrs. Lusted.

Activities Many
Mrs. Lusted at 82 still maintains an abundance of interest and zest in life. During the war she was active in the Red Cross. She belongs to several lodges.

Commenting on the recent cutting of timber on Lusted hill Mrs. Lusted said "I hate to see the trees cut down, they were so pretty."

However, driving down Lusted hill on a sunshiny day gives one a fine view of Mabery valley with its neat farms, green trees in the distance and Sandy river in the background, she concluded.

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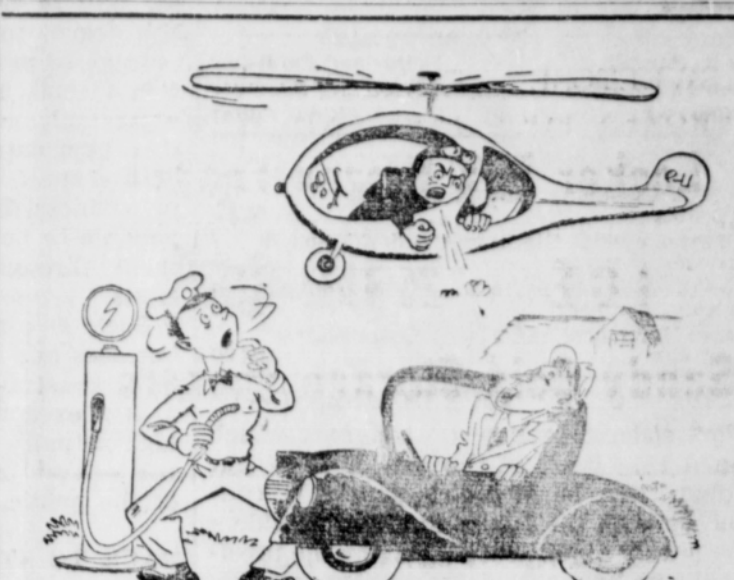
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
