40 Traffic Deaths Recorded in Month

Oregon traffic mishaps claimed
40 victims in July to reach the
mark for the third consecutive
month, Secretary of State Earl T.
Newberry reported today.

Later deaths attributed to July
crashes may boost the final fig-
ure past the 42 fatalities recorded
in May and again in June, New-
berry pointed out. The high three-
month toll has reversed a down-
ward trend established in the first
four months to the point where
1948 deaths are now only 19 under
the total for the same period last
year.

Urban areas accounted for nine
of the deaths, with rural sections
—open highway accidents—claim-
ing 31. Sharp increases in traf-
fic volumes coupled with the
three-day Fourth of July holiday
contributed heavily to the month's
fatalities, the secretary said.

He urged drivers to meet the
hazards of increased traffic by
"Thinking ahead as well as look-
ing ahead."
