REA Overcomes Many Troubles

do other work on a self-help plan that is the members would do the work and be paid for it. This would give each member an opportunity to earn enough money to have his house wired and buy needed appliances. REA approved the plan.

Construction of the line was started early in 1941. The first unit of the line was completed in the early part of November, 1941, and 137 members of the cooperative received electricity.

War Created Difficulties

But by that time increasing prices and shortages due to the war situation were making affairs difficult for the cooperative. As soon as war was declared, the government stopped all construction of electric lines. This prevented the cooperative from serving new customers and kept farmers from buying electrical appliances which would increase their use of power.

In borrowing money the cooperative had expected to be able to complete its entire system promptly and that the use of electricity would increase. As a result, some months the coopera-

tive could not meet its full principal and interest payments.

Rules Were Relaxed

But as the importance of electricity on farms was realized, rules were relaxed and extensions based on animal units were allowed. Then extension of lines to farms within 1,000 feet of existing lines was allowed.

Finally, in spite of many difficult obstacles put in its path, the cooperative won in its attempt to add the Mt. Hood area to its territory. That line for which clearing is now far advanced, will bring light and power to one of the greatest recreational areas in America.
