Measure Pillows Before Buying Cases, Says Agent

Measure your bed pillows before buying pillow cases, suggests Janet Taylor, Clackamas county extension agent.

Cases should be at least 3 inches longer than the pillow and fit easily around its circumference, she said. Cases that are too tight tend to make the pillow hard and uncomfortable and may rip at the seams. If the case is too large it will look unattractive and wrinkle unduly.

Miss Taylor suggests buying muslin cases for durability, although percale is smoother, softer and lighter in weight.

Plan to keep on hand at least 3 cases for each pillow, says Miss Taylor.

Sunday School Teacher for 7 Decades To Be Honored at Service on Sunday

PLEASANT HOME—Still active as Bible class leader after teaching Sunday school for nearly 70 years is the record set by C. A. O'Harrow, Cottrell, who will celebrate his 91st birthday Monday, Oct. 25.

Mr. O'Harrow will be honored at next Sunday morning's service at Friendly Corner Methodist church at Pleasant Home by the special appearance of the Men's chorus, which for the 2nd consecutive year will sing Mr. O'Harrow's favorite hymn, "God Be With You 'Till We Meet Again."

Besides his church interests Mr. O'Hara loves to work in his berry field, putting in a full 8 hours daily. According to F. A. Matheson, a nephew who 50 years ago was a member of Mr. O'Harrow's Sunday school class, "We just can't keep him from working. Why he practically puts in union hours. Even the rain doesn't stop him for he has a special rain suit for such occasions."

"He always insists on putting in full hours," said Mrs. Matheson. "Last week his watch stopped and he came in for lunch an hour early. He consoled himself by saying it would give him a longer afternoon to work in."

Mr. and Mrs. Matheson have been keeping house for Mr. O'Harrow in the absence of his daughter, Mrs. Ethel Peterson, with whom he has made his home for the past 8 years.

Asked how he could keep up such a pace at which men much younger quailed, Mr. O'Harrow gave all credit for his ability to work to having lived the "Good life." "I dedicated my life to God," he said simply.

Mr. O'Harrow was born in Rockford, Ia., where he spent his early life farming. Later he engaged in the coal distributing business with his son, Arthur and George, in Mason City, Ia.

Mrs. O'Harrow died in March, 1918.

He has 4 more daughters, Mrs. Mae Elder, Nichols, Ia.; Mrs. Gertrude Bell, Nora Springs, S.D.; Mrs. Alta Janick, Memphis, Tenn., and Mrs. Myrtle Baridow, Willits, Calif. His son, Arthur O'Harrow, now lives in Portland. George O'Harrow lives at Mason City.
